Whatever those people were doing didn't meet with what government thought should be done so they disbanded it, and they got some criticism and should have gotten more. Do you support the park's construction? Including a pool? And the cost?</b></p> | <p><b>Magna-Rees</b></p> <p>Is an ongoing process and it's going to be a while before anything comes of it. Would like to see the current pool area get revitalized. Think cost is quite excessive. There has to be a way to build a pool/park and not have it cost so much money. Can't please everyone, but can try to have something nice at less cost.</p> | <p><b>Watson</b></p> <p>Details are being withheld because of the election. If you want to get a project passed, first you say, we are going to spend \$19 million. People say "Oh my goodness, that's too much." Could you settle for \$8 million or \$6.5 million? It's called breaking down resistance. Greenwood does not need a parks department. Ordinary resident is not going to use dog park or water park. Perry Park has a pool, city has a pool and wants to build another. A city the size of Greenwood doesn't need that kind of bond and debt. Didn't agree with buying land because it took that piece of property off tax rolls. Would support a pool, but not an indoor/outdoor pool.</p> |
