Wall Street
 NEW YORK — A drop in oil prices below \$60 a barrel sent stocks soaring Tuesday, carrying the Dow Jones industrial average 136 points higher and past 11,000 for the first time in a month. A surge in retail sales added to the market's good mood.

The Dow rose 136.07, or 1.25 percent, to 11,028.39, its first foray past 11,000 since Jan. 12.

Broader stock indicators also closed sharply higher. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 12.67, or 1 percent, to 1,275.53, and the Nasdaq composite index rose 22.36, or 1 percent, to 2,262.17.


Advancing issues outnumbered decliners by more than 2 to 1 on the New York Stock Exchange.




Wind Chill Today



The prosecutor's office hasn't received the toxicologist's report, which will also tell them how much marijuana was used, he said.

A 15-year-old passenger who was riding with Slinger told police that they had smoked marijuana about 15 minutes before his car ran into a car at the intersection of County roads 575E and 600N, according to a probable cause affidavit.

Police found a small bag of marijuana and a set of measuring scales where Slinger's red Toyota truck had flipped onto its passenger side, the affidavit said. Slinger and the passenger were taken to Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis, where Slinger tested positive for marijuana, the affidavit said.

He failed to yield the right of way to the other car, pushing them into a utility pole before they went into a farm field, the affidavit said.

Slinger told officers that as he approached the intersection, he blacked out and did not remember what happened, the affidavit said.

April Mulry, 29, who was a passenger in the other car, suffered head trauma and other injuries from the crash and died at Johnson Memorial Hospital.

Her husband, Brian Mulry, 34, was driving the vehicle, and their then 1-month-old daughter was in the vehicle as well.

Slinger is also set to attend a court hearing today on charges of operating a vehicle while intoxicated in a property damage accident on Jan. 9.

In that accident, he reportedly drove the wrong way in the south-bound lanes of U.S. 31 at speeds of 90 to 100 mph and nearly hit another vehicle head on, according to a Johnson County Sheriff's Office report.

A blood alcohol test showed his blood alcohol level to be .15, nearly twice the .08 limit for someone to be considered to be driving drunk, the report said. Slinger, 764 Shoreview Drive, is out on \$16,000 bond.

On one of the most romantic days of the year, Simpson was decked out in a red suit and red shoes and wore a corsage to marry the 10 couples who wanted the day as their anniversary.

Originally, 12 couples had scheduled weddings Tuesday. The first appointment canceled, and another couple didn't show up.

The cancellations, sometimes for cold feet, are normal.

"People don't decide not to get married once they show up. They decide before they ever come here," she said.

The second couple, who married at 9:30 a.m., was one of Simpson's favorites of the day.

Family members of Mike and Lisa Painter waited in the hallway for the ceremony to start. The bride and groom smiled and held hands as they walked to the metal arch that awaits couples in the basement of the courthouse.

Simpson thinks the arch provides a needed ceremonial atmosphere to the dim basement with brick walls. Most of what surrounds the couples is filing cabinets and workers hunched over computers.

Mike Painter, 47, and Lisa Painter, 43, both of Bargersville, were supposed to wed in August. But the happy couple couldn't wait, he said.

After hugs and pictures, they headed off to their first breakfast as a married couple.

Many happy couples hugged Simpson after the ceremony, which was witnessed by usually just her.

She's used to the regular sayings of the vows, exchanging of rings and pronouncing a couple as man and wife. She still holds the paper with the words of the ceremony at every wedding, although she has them memorized and likes to annoy her husband of 48 years with her rehearsals.

Unlike what happens in other counties, Simpson doesn't charge couples to perform the ceremony. Each couple pays \$20 for a marriage license, a fee throughout the state, and can perform the wedding right then if Simpson has the time.

At 10:30 a.m., another happy couple trotted into the voter registration office, noticing the hearts hanging from the ceiling.

Simpson gushed over the beautiful bride, Penny Jackson, 30,

who wore white pants and a red shirt.

Her soon-to-be husband worried no one would be able to take pictures, but he soon found a volunteer.

"We held off for so long, we figured it would be cool to get married today," Jermel Jackson, 31, said with a laugh.

The day would also provide an easy-to-remember anniversary date, Simpson said.

But the couple were packing another celebration into the day, Jermel Jackson's birthday.

After vows, kisses and a few pictures, the two headed off together to start their life.

With four kids — aged 10, 9, 8 and 2 months — and a new home in Greenwood they'll likely have little time to celebrate.

Between candidates adding their names to this year's election ballots and phone calls, 10 couples came into the voter registration office to get married.

Each was unique. Some were in their 20s. Others in their 40s. Some who had only known each other a short time.

Some couples got married on the day because of the holiday, and others married because of the obvious reason.

"Because we love each other," groom Gregory Toombs of Acton said with a smile to his new bride, Monica Toombs.

students due process for a suspension and denied the request to halt the suspensions.

The students served the suspension and are now back in classes pending the outcome of an expulsion hearing next week. Meanwhile, Parsley's parents, Kay and Steve Byerly, are considering another lawsuit against the school district after they say a teacher gave their daughter a prescription drug on the trip.

High and Parsley, who are also cousins, both went to a dude ranch in Arizona during the school's annual intensive week in January.

Students on the trip stayed at a ranch-like resort where alcohol was accessible in a common lounge area, said the Byerlys and Eric and Debra Hight, Tara's parents.

An employee at the ranch reported to teachers that a bottle of wine was missing, but the incident was not investigated during the trip, the Hights and Byerlys said.

Instead, Turner investigated the incident after students returned from the trip and met with each girl on Jan. 13, the Hights and Byerlys said.

Both girls denied they stole and drank the wine. According to the lawsuit, Turner told one of the parents that one student had witnessed the girls with the bottle.

Turner met with each girl and their parents the next week and told them the girls would be suspended for 10 days. He advised them to sign a waiver of their rights to due process to avoid being expelled from school, the students say.

"If they say they took (the bottle) and sign a paper, they can stay in school," said Rick Doyle, the attorney representing the students. "But we want them to tell the truth and not say they did it
