Edinburgh wants to update trails

Kim Smith doesn't consider herself an exercise nut and typically rides her bike through Edinburgh a couple times a year. But the Edinburgh woman would make her biking a weekly routine if trails were put in around town, she said.

Now, a plan is beginning to make that happen.

Town leaders are exploring where they can install walking trails to connect the community and compete with larger places that already have paths, including Greenwood, Franklin and Columbus.

"It's the wave right now," parks director Brad Teter said about trails.

"People will walk for exercise, but just as many will walk for purpose to get somewhere and do something. That's what we need."

So far, the community is gathering input from residents about where they would like to see trails, Teter said.

A public meeting brought about 30 people together earlier this month to talk about the need for trails, where they could go and how much the projects would cost.

Some ideas have included the town's 40-acre Irwin Park, spots along the riverfront and trails that connect the schools and parks with the town's community pool and downtown area, he said.

People have also suggested adding about four miles of side-

walk from the town to the Edinburgh Premium Outlet Mall, located across the county line.

"All we've got now are remnants of old trails in Irwin Park from decades ago when people would go hiking through the woods," Teter said. "We need something that is comparable to modern trails, but that won't be successful unless the community is behind us."

He said the community will start surveying in the spring how much property it owns and how they could pay for projects without having to buy land.

Town officials also want to con-

sider applying for grants to help pay for trails, instead of having to raise taxes, Teter said.

The process could take more than 10 years to complete, with portions of work happening each year, he said.

Smith, who has lived in Edinburgh since 1978, looks forward to the day when some trails will be laid around the community.

If she had access to trails in town, Smith said she would likely ride her bike to the mall area and take trips to the riverfront and Irwin Park.

Trails would help make a trip from town to the mall area safer for children and families, Smith said.

"I didn't have the insight to see this happen in Edinburgh before, but now I'm seeing all kinds of possibilities," she said.

"We can have what people see and admire in other communities, and a way to appreciate our surroundings."

"I did my research. So I know I made the best choice."
