CG parents can weigh in on school

Meeting set for Thursday to focus on ideas for expanding high school

Parents of elementary schoolage children in the Center Grove area who want to give their opinions on what their child's high school education will be like will have a chance this week.

Center Grove administrators have been talking for years about the need to expand the high

These questions and more are being studied by the high school expansion task force, and Thursday night will be the community's first chance to hear what school leaders are considering.

A public forum at the high school will include administrators presenting enrollment information, showing pictures and video clips of crowded halls and traffic jams and reporting on visits to several high schools around the state.

Parents and patrons will then

have a chance to ask questions.

Members of the task force have traveled around the state studying how other schools have built a smaller school for freshmen within the high school.

But it was a conference a couple months ago that was what Assistant Superintendent Janet Boyle calls an "aha" moment.

Hearing experts talk about the link between Indiana high schools and the Indiana economy will now send Boyle and Center Grove High School Principal Matt Shockley around the country looking at some of the most innovative high schools.

"We need to be thinking way ahead," Boyle said. "This (expansion) would open in 2009 at the earliest and have to last us 20 to The forum will give parents and

community members a chance for input as well, Boyle said.

"We need to start helping our

community understand why we won't do the traditional 'add 30 new rooms," she said.

'We can't do what we've always done and we want them in on the conversation."

Some of the models of high schools Boyle and Shockley will visit include schools that are high tech, those that mirror college courses but use high school curriculum and those set up in smaller schools based on careers or subjects students are interested in.

Another forum will be planned for April or May or report on the trips and the rest of the work by the committee.

The committee is expected to make a recommendation to the school board in June about what kind of program would be best for the high school.

The board and administration would then plan the building project around the program.


