Cindy Jarvis will close her store at 1001 N. State Road 135 in Greenwood at the end of March.

The Bargersville woman moved her store, Cindy's Closet, from Franklin to its current location in 2004, hoping to draw more customers and revenue at a larger Greenwood store.

Though she loves Cindy's, she loves her family more and wants to be there for them 100 percent, she said.

While working at the store, Jarvis was also managing the books for her husband's business, looking after the Bloomington drive-in movie theater she and her husband own, and raising two children who attend Center Grove schools.

### Monster of an event

Frankenstein is alive at the Greenwood Public Library.

A national traveling exhibit teaching communities about Frankenstein, the era the book was written in, movies and monster literature is coming to the Greenwood library through a grant from the American Library Association.

The exhibit will feature literature, artwork, documents and more.

Sara Karloff, the original movie monster's daughter, will kick off the exhibit at an open house from 5 to 7 p.m. Friday. She will talk about Boris Karloff, his adventures as the monster and his legacy. While the original Frankenstein film is in black and white, Karloff owns the only color footage of her father in full Frankenstein makeup.

Never read "Frankenstein?" Not a problem. Because the novel by Mary Shelley is being promoted as a community read, Friends of the Greenwood Public Library are giving the book away.

Throughout the exhibit, children's craft classes, adult and child book discussions, academic presentations and activities will take place. And don't miss Monster Movie Mondays. From 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. each Monday, the library will show Frankenstein movie classics.

"Mad Science," an all-ages presentation of science demonstrations, will be at 1 p.m. March 25. According to the library's brochure, this interactive event will "make your hair stand on end."

The traveling exhibit, "Frankenstein: Penetrating the Secrets of Nature" was developed by the National Library of Medicine in collaboration with the American Library Association. It has traveled to roughly 80 libraries in the United States. The Greenwood Public Library is its last stop.

## CVS to join apartments, commercial developments planned for Trafalgar

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A Trafalgar developer plans to bring a bank, restaurants, a CVS pharmacy and new apartments to the growing southern Johnson County town.

Local builder Michael Allen is developing 19 acres northeast of the intersection of State Roads 135 and 252, which is empty land across from Indian Creek High School.

Allen hopes to start building Trafalgar Pointe in May and bring in the first tenants this year, including a CVS pharmacy that he expects to open this summer.

"That's been a forgotten area for a long time," he said. "But because of convergence of two state roads, it's an important crossroads for Trafalgar. That's a gateway into the county but also into the hills of southern Indiana."

Entrances will be off both highways, according to site plans.

Behind the commercial center to the west, Allen plans to use about 6½ acres to build apartments.

He does not know the type or how many units might be constructed, but he said he would like to market them to people associated with Camp Atterbury, located about six miles southeast of Trafalgar.

"We think there's a need for housing for military families," he said.

His company plans to conduct a study this spring to determine what

kinds of apartments are needed, he said.

Allen plans to bring in all eight tenants within the next two years and build the apartments during that time.

He would not discuss what companies he is trying to recruit, but he said CVS is a buyer and will be the anchor of the development.

Other nearby CVS pharmacies are in Edinburg, Franklin, Greenwood, Nashville, Whiteland and the Center Grove area.

# Donors can give hikers, bikers place to rest

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Many benches that will offer rest to walkers and bikers on Greenwood's trails will have a special meaning.

Benches are planned every quarter- to half-mile along the city's trails.

Members of the city's Trails Advisory Board hope plaques honoring donors or their loved ones will

help pay for the benches and for future projects.

New benches will have 3-by-5-inch bronze plaques that list the donor's name as a sponsor or are dedicated in memory of a friend or relative.

The benches cost \$1,000 each.

About a third of the money will go to the cost of the plaque, the engraved message and construction of the bench, said Don Cummings, former chairman of the board.

The rest will help fund future projects, including paving walking and biking trails and improvements to parks, he said.

Donors can also give money for other amenities on the trails and parks, such as fountains, landscaping and restrooms, said Evan Springer, Greenwood parks and recreation director.

To donate, people must send a check with the memo stating

Greenwood Trails Bench Sponsorship to the Johnson County Community Foundation, at P.O. Box 217, Franklin, IN 46131.

Donors also should send an e-mail to [trails@greenwood.in.gov](mailto:trails@greenwood.in.gov) indicating that they have donated, what they want the plaque to read and if they have a preferred location for the bench.

People also can sponsor an existing bench.

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
