DID YOU KNOW?

AT THE BALLOT BOX: The first election in Johnson County was conducted on March 8, 1823. Two judges were elected, along with a recorder and three commissioners. The county population was about 500 at the time. There were two polling places, in White River Township and Blue River Township. The first grand jury convened shortly after the election. It indicted four men for "assault, battery and affray" as a result of a drunken brawl on Election Day.

Greenwood resident Tony Milano runs his studio from a strip mall on Polk Street near downtown, serving most of central Indiana as one of only three in the state.

This weekend, anyone curious about what the locally created glass products look like can watch ABC's "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition" at 8 p.m. Sunday. The show will feature glass samples in a home in Oklahoma.

"You can get 27 different (styles of) blinds at Home Depot, and that's it; but here you can make your exact piece of glass," Milano said. "You're only limited by your imagination."

Milano and his five-person crew make glass for about 300 homes a year. The company has won about 20 national design awards since starting up in 2002.

Milano said he and his wife, Sarah, started the local franchise after about 10 years of studying and tinkering with decorative glass.
