Grizzlies suffer first home loss of season

Transylvania was leery of the Franklin College men's basketball team, and rightfully so. But in the end, the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference leader survived Wednesday night's visit to Spurlock Center, where the host Grizzlies lost for the first time this season.

Transylvania (15-3, 6-1 HCAC) held on for a 75-69 win in a game that went down to the final two minutes.

Fifth-year Pioneers coach Brian Lane was relieved to leave Franklin with a victory.

"We were actually scared to death of this game," Lane said. "We were really, really concerned about how well they shoot the ball."

"And when you have (senior center Nick) Kane inside, you can take away threes, but you're giving up the inside points."

Franklin led most of the way before Transylvania took a 60-56 lead late in the second half on a 3-point basket by senior point guard Marc Bain.

Moments later, Franklin freshman guard Dustin Marshall converted a three-point play, making a layup and a free throw to trim the deficit to 62-59.

But on the next possession, Bain was

fouled and made two free throws, putting the Pioneers up 64-59.

Franklin would not recover. Bain went on to make four more free throws in the closing seconds to seal the win for the Pioneers.

Bain finished with a game-high 20 points. He was 6 of 13 from the field and 7 of 7 from the free-throw line.

Kane, whose 13 first-half points helped the Grizzlies enjoy a 37-34 halftime lead, led his team with 15 points. But he was limited to one basket in the second half.

Sophomore forward Jon Neill and Marshall finished with 14 points each for the Grizzlies.

"I couldn't be more pleased with how hard we went at trying to score (in the final minute)," Franklin coach Kerry Prather. "You get to a point in these games when it's less of an 'X and O' proposition than the urgency of executing what you've got to get done."

With the loss, Franklin has dropped nine straight regular-season games to Transylvania dating back to 2001.

The Grizzlies (12-6, 4-3) travel to HCAC rival Defiance on Saturday. Defiance won this season's first meeting, 87-77.

Franklin College women trounce Transylvania

Still smarting from its upset loss this past weekend, the Franklin College women's basketball team jumped on host Transylvania University early on the way to an 80-62 victory in their Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference women's basketball game Wednesday.

The win improved the league-leading Grizzlies to 6-1 in the HCAC and 15-3 overall and dropped the Pioneers to 3-4 in the conference and 5-12 overall.

Franklin, which fell on the road to Mount St. Joseph on Saturday, broke out to an 11-point lead in the first five minutes at Transylvania and steadily built its lead to 20 with 1:24 left in the opening period.

The Grizzlies, who buried five 3-point baskets in the opening half, held a 44-26 advan-

tage at the intermission.

In the second half, the Pioneers made a run, whittling Franklin's lead to 10 points on a basket by Jessica Distler with 13:15 remaining.

But it was the closest Transylvania would get before the visitors put the decision in hand with a 14-6 run to go up by 18 with 6:30 to go.

The Grizzlies were led by seniors Becky Ballard and Lindsey Roberson with 18 and 17 points, respectively. Junior Brittany Beehler added a season-best 11 points and six assists.

The Pioneers were paced by Rachel Wilson's 14 points. Distler added 13, and Jessica Gilbert chipped in with 12.
