Tuesday's victory marked the second straight game the Warriors (13-3) won by 50 points or more. It was also the sixth time this season they've won by 30 or more.

Washington (2-13), which had stopped an 11-game losing streak last week, had been losing games by an average of more than 52 points. Whiteland coach Bill Hogue was aware of that, so he deviated from his usual starting five.

The only usual starter was junior Rusti White.

"Honestly, I'm not sure what you can learn from a game like this," Hogue said. "One advantage is you get to play a lot of kids who normally don't see a lot of time, and that can help you later on this season or next.

"But as I've said before, we still haven't played a decent four quarters since before the Christmas

Without its normal starters, Whiteland still roared to a 20-8 first-quarter lead and expanded it to 44-11 at halftime.

But instead of scoring on every opportunity, Hogue instructed the Warriors to run set plays and give ball-handling experience to inexperienced players.

Despite the lopsided outcome, Washington coach Kelin Mark praised Hogue and Whiteland's players for not intentionally running up the score.
