seed and the defending tournament champion. Illinois has reached the final game the past three years, winning in 2003 and 2005 and finishing second in 2004.

"We found a way to win, but we've got to get a lot better in the next 25 hours or so," Izzo said.

Purdue (9-19), which has never won the conference tournament and was seeded 11th, was eliminated in its first tourney game for the fifth straight year and finished 0-14 away from home this season despite 20 points by Gary Ware.

"We had a great effort," Purdue coach Matt Painter said. "We've struggled shooting the basketball the past four or five games. It's too bad, because these guys have worked hard to get better." The Boilermakers had four projected

starters who were out with injuries or sus-

pended most of the season, although they got one of them back with a surprise appearance by 270-pound freshman Nate Minnoy. "I was going to try to play him a little bit to see how he looked out there," Painter

said. "It's just hard in transition for him. ... He gave a great effort. He missed some shots but he was aggressive.' Matt Kiefer, who added 16 points for Purdue, hit two free throws for the Boiler-

makers' final lead at 20-19, but a dunk by Paul Davis put the Spartans on top for good with less than 6 minutes left before halftime. 'We were careless with the ball. That led them to getting out on the break," Kiefer said.

Purdue managed only two more baskets in the next 5 minutes, both by Ware, and Michigan State opened a 31-24 lead before Bryant Dillon scored on a rebound tip in the closing seconds of the period.
