Colts make offer to backup safety

INDIANAPOLIS

The Indianapolis Colts offered backup safety Gerome Sapp a one-year tender worth \$721,600 on Friday.

Sapp's agent, Scott Smith, confirmed the move late Friday.

Sapp was to become a restricted free agent when the market opened today. He can still negotiate with other teams, but the Colts could match another team's offer.

The move was the latest in Indy's effort to retain its own free agents. In the past two weeks, the Colts kept

receiver Reggie Wayne and defensive lineman Raheem Brock off the unrestricted market by signing them to longterm deals; they also re-signed starting middle linebacker Gary Brackett to a four-year deal, preventing him from becoming a restricted free agent.

The Colts had previously offered oneyear tenders to Pro Bowl linebacker Cato June (\$1.55 million) and sacks leader Robert Mathis (\$2.069 million).

They also offered low one-year tenders to backup receiver Aaron Moorehead, backup lineman Makoa Freitas and gave league minimum deals to starting guard Ryan Lilja and tight end Ben Utecht.

Four prominent players were expected to hit the open market: Colts career rushing leader Edgerrin James; former Pro Bowl kicker Mike Vanderjagt, the franchise's scoring leader; starting linebacker David Thornton and defensive tackle Larry Tripplett, who has been a key piece in the Colts' defensive line rotation.

Team president Bill Polian has said he believes there's a 50-50 chance the team can retain James now that the salary cap has risen from \$94.5 million to \$102 million.

But Polian acknowledged Thursday that it would be difficult for the Colts to keep both Thornton and James.

Later in the third, Indiana rookie Danny Granger gestured toward the Hornets as he walked off the floor after being smacked in the face attempting to follow Jamaal Tinsley's miss.

The Pacers took a one-point lead into the fourth quarter and quickly expanded it to five before the Hornets scored six straight points to go up 80-79 on Aaron Williams' putback.

Neither team hit a field goal for a span of 4 minutes until Stojakovic whirled past Paul for a layup that put Indiana up 87-83 with 4:55 left.

West converted a three-point play and a basket to give New Orleans a 90-89 lead before Stojakovic's game-winner.

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
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
