Davenport plays tough, advances at Aussie Open

Lindsay Davenport got a tough workout from Karolina Sprem in the second round of the Australian Open before advancing today with a 7-6 (4), 6-3 victory. After trading breaks in the third and fourth games, the first set went on serve, with Davenport winning the 12th game at love to force a tiebreaker. Trailing 3-1, the top-ranked Davenport rallied after Sprem double-faulted, winning six of the final seven points and claiming the set with consecutive forehand winners. Davenport, the 2000 Australian champion, had six breakpoint chances in the second set before finally converting after the sixth game went to deuce six times. Two of Davenport's three previous wins against Sprem have come at majors. She won in the fourth-round here last year en route to the final and the quarterfinals at Wimbledon in 2004, after Sprem had upset then defending champion Venus Williams. Sprem worked Davenport around with some big serves and powerful forehands in the 1 hour, 25-minute match on Vodafone Arena but let herself down with nine double-faults. Davenport was consistent, winning 80 percent of points on her first serve, firing six aces and hitting 18 winners.
