Josh Malitski constantly checked his watch.

"Don't worry, we'll make the game on time," Ted Brynn said. Kickoff was in an hour, and Malitski and Brynn were finishing dinner at Rock Bottom Brewery a few blocks away from the RCA Dome in downtown Indianapolis.

Malitski, 36, is a Patriots fan but decided not to wear any New England gear.

His brother-in-law, Brynn, drove from East Lansing, Mich., to attend the game with Malitski, who is a faculty member at Indiana University in Bloomington.

The two sat at a table near the main bar with Scott Collevechio and Collevechio's fiancee, Katie Wells, both of whom are Colts fans.

Malitski and Brynn finally left for the game at 5:55 p.m. with parting words for their friends.

"Good luck," Malitski said. "I

think you might need it.' As the game started, Colts fans in the bar began to chant. "Let's go Colts! Super Bowl!

Super Bowl!" They rose to their feet and cheered on the defense on a fourth and inches for New England with nine minutes

remaining in the first quarter. Patriots running back Corey Dillon raced 35 yards down the field, quieting the crowd.

A few plays later, Colts fans jumped to their feet again as Laurence Maroney fumbled a handoff from Tom Brady.

"Get it," Collevechio yelled at one of the dozen TV sets in view. The ball bounced around but found its way into the arms of

Patriots offensive lineman Logan Mankins for a touchdown. "No way. You've got to be kidding me," a dejected Wells said.

A phone call from Malitski, undoubtedly to boast, went unanswered. Things got worse for Colle-

vechio and Wells when Dillon scored a touchdown, running untouched into the end zone.

Down 14-3, some of the Colts fans were noticeably nervous.

A few minutes later, nervousness turns into despair as Asante Samuel intercepted a Peyton Manning pass and returned it for a touchdown.

Collevechio threw his hat in disgust. Wells buried her hands in her face

Again Malitski called. And again, no one answered.

Work of art

Jason Montgomery woke up at 7 a.m. Sunday.

Kickoff for the AFC Championship Game wasn't for anoth-

er 11 hours, but preparations for "the biggest game of my life" were enough to get Montgomery out of bed and ready to go.

After they arrived in the parking lot west of Lucas Oil Stadium, the cold wreaked havoc on Jason Montgomery's face paint. What once was a pristine white face now had cracks.

"It's not a problem," he said. "We're going to touch it up like every hour.'


When asked why not just wait until they are ready to leave the parking lot for the game to repaint his face, Jason Montgomery provided the rationale.






