# Full-Force hype

Speaking of hype machines, the one for National Hot Rod Association Funny Car rookie Ashley Force seems to be in full gear.

Force made her Funny Car debut in this past weekend's season opener in Pomona, Calif. She lost in the first round to brother-in-law Robert Hight when her Mustang lost traction.

The NHRA has been desperately searching for its version of Danica Patrick ever since Patrick became a sensation by almost winning in the Indy Racing League.

Previous attempts haven't produced results: Top Fuel driver Melanie

Troxel, who faded quickly after a fast start last season; inexperienced Top Fuel driver Hillary Will; ineffective Pro Stock driver Erica Enders; and Pro Stock Motorcycle driver Angelle Sampey, who frequently wins but has an abrasive personality.

But Force seems to have a potential as a driver; she's attractive and personable; she has the wealth of her father, Funny Car champion John Force, behind her; and she is part of a reality TV show, albeit an awful one.

One sign that Force is becoming the Danica of drag racing: The Associated Press, which rarely sends drag-racing stories to all of its member media outlets, covered Force's debut and little else at the NHRA Winternationals.

Their story from Sunday's finals focused almost entirely on Force's first-round loss and threw in at the end — as if to say, "Who cares?" — a paragraph on the men who won in the three professional categories.

MERCER graduate had seven hits in 12 at-bats as Dayton dropped all three games. Five of his hits were doubles, and he had at least two hits in each game, as well as three RBIs and two runs scored.
