The wedding is set for July 21 at La Caille at Quail Run in Little Cottonwood Canyon, Utah.



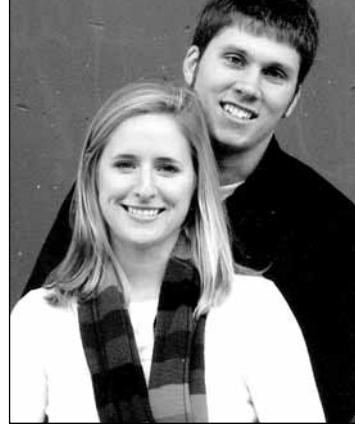
Molly Andrews Jeff Edgel

The wedding is set for Sept. 22 at College Park Church in Huntington.



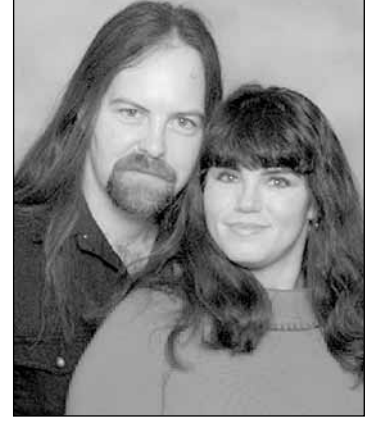
Katherine Clemons Joseph Hartwell

The wedding is set for June 23 in Franklin.

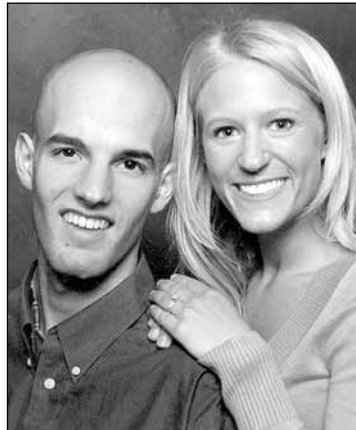


Laura Nicholson Tyler Gay

The wedding is set for Aug. 4 in Muncie.



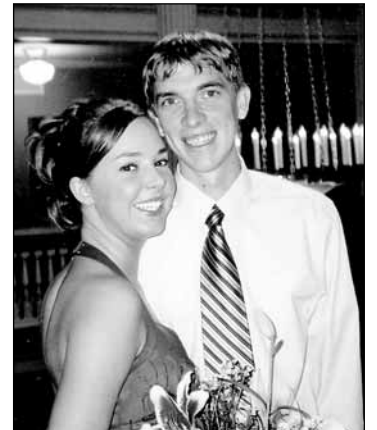
Melissa Bush Kevin Coy

There was a time when spending time in the garden meant enjoying the act of gardening, as well as the fruits of our own labor. For some of us, it still does.

But for others the ritual of cutting the grass on Saturday mornings, followed by a lazy afternoon in a simple hammock, has yielded to hired help and full-scale outdoor rooms, designed to relax and to entertain.

The trends of 2007 for gardening and outdoor living continue to reinforce our need for instant gratification. As revenues for traditional consumer lawn and garden products remain flat, homeowners are pouring money into expanding their living space outdoors.

HOME HINTS

Stay on high alert

Keep in mind that smoke and carbon-monoxide detectors only last so long. Look carefully and you will see date limits on most of the newer models that give some indication as to when the detecting mechanisms may stop working reliably.

The test buttons test the electronic circuits, not the detector mechanisms. If you have had your detector for more than five years, it is best to replace it with a new one.

When selecting a location for a carbon-monoxide monitor, avoid areas where there is a strong breeze. Any gas may not stay in the detector long enough to get a reading.

Also avoid placing detectors in walkways and areas with poor air circulation, because this will

allow dangerous levels of CO to accumulate. It is recommended to have a detector near the door to the garage (but not in the breeze-way) and one near the furnace area.

Most importantly, there should be a detector in or near bedrooms. While asleep, we cannot discern the symptoms of CO poisoning and need to rely on detectors.

Symptoms of CO poisoning can vary, but the most common symptoms are flu-like, including dizziness, fatigue, headaches, nausea and tightness in the chest.

Wave Purple is an All America Selections Classic, boasting non-stop, bright purple flowers on compact spreading plants.

We are demanding more performance from our plants, too. Even good looks alone aren't always enough in some cases anymore, especially in smaller gardens. Today we need our plants to multi-task such as being ornamental and edible.

Yes, outdoor living, and the plants that adorn these spaces are more hi-tech than ever. Thankfully, manufacturers and plant breeders alike are responding to our ever-increasing demands for comfort, convenience and low maintenance.
