Police seek two in attempted CG carjacking

Police are looking for two suspects in an attempted carjacking

JACKSON

in the Center Grove area two weeks ago. The Johnson

County Sheriff's Office is asking the public for information concerning the whereabouts of Timothy Jackson, 21, and Roger Max Scott, 25, both of Indianapolis. Scott goes by the nickname "Cheese."

Warrants have been issued for their arrests for RICHARDS attempted carjacking, a Class B felony that carries up to 20 years in jail.

An Indianapolis woman, arrested last week on charges of battery and carjacking, told **SCOTT** police she



planned the crime with the men to help a co-worker leave her boyfriend. The victim later identified the men from a police photographic lineup, sheriff's detective Bryan Wolfe said.

A man told police he was leaving for work at 3 a.m. Jan. 24 when a man ran up and tried to pull him from the vehicle in the driveway of his home on Driftwood Lane near Smith

Valley and Morgantown roads. The victim closed the door and locked it. Another man tried to open the passenger side door, according to a probable cause affidavit. The second suspect

pointed a handgun at him as the first man beat on the driver's side door, the affidavit said.

The victim backed out of his driveway and sped to the first intersection, at Runyon Road.

He turned around and shined his brights to determine where the subjects went. One suspect was running toward him, according to the affidavit. He sped off and told police he believes he struck the suspect, according to

As he drove away, the victim saw a Pontiac Grand Prix going down a side street.

A deputy had pulled over a similar car 40 minutes before the incident after observing it driving around in circles in the Brentwood neighborhood. He identified the driver as Nicole Richards and the passenger as Jackson, according to the affidavit.

The victim identified Jackson from a photographic lineup and recognized Richards from a photo as someone he had met at

Richards told police a co-worker asked that they steal her boyfriend's car and beat him up, the affidavit said. Police are investigating whether others should face criminal charges, Johnson County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Doug Cox said.

Richards told police she planned the crime with Jackson and Scott, discussing using an unloaded handgun, Wolfe said.

Richards was released from the Johnson County jail Friday on \$21,000 bond.

The suspects are considered dangerous and known to be in the area of 42nd Street and Post Road in Indianapolis, according to a news release.

Two Franklin residents saw their grandfather's portrait hung in the governor's office Monday. Maureen Pinnick and Dorothy Mann, both of Franklin, are granddaughters of World War I flying ace and aviation pioneer Harvey Weir Cook. His portrait was added to the Hoosier Heritage Portrait Collection in the governor's office Monday. The two joined Gov. Mitch Daniels and other members of the Cook family and representatives from aviation and veterans organizations to watch the unveiling. Cook, a native of Wilkinson in Hancock County, was a pioneer in bringing Indianapolis its first principal airport. Indianapolis International Airport was known as Weir-Cook Airport from 1944-76. He was a noted flying ace and captain during World War I, credited with downing seven enemy aircraft. He later returned to military service as a lieutenant colonel in World War II. He was killed in a crash while flying over New Zealand in 1943.
