# Burst pipe leads to boil order near West Grove

Children at West Grove Elementary School will drink bottled water and use paper plates and plastic utensils until a boil advisory has been lifted for the area. The warning to boil water for five minutes before using it was issued after a pipe burst near the intersection of Smith Valley and Mullinix roads Saturday morning. Now, the Center Grove school, residents and others in the area are taking measures to kill any possible contaminants in the drinking water.

Soil and dirt may have entered the water system when the broken pipe was replaced and contaminated the water, Bargersville water assistant superintendent Bill Reynolds said.

As a precaution, about 17 homes in the area, a few along Smith Valley, Mullinix and Olive Branch roads, as well as the school, a gas station and a fire station were given the advisory.

Two tests will be done by water utility employees this week to see if any bacteria are in the water.

The department should know by Wednesday if the water is safe to use, Reynolds said.

The Johnson County Health Department helped school officials take steps to ensure students, staff and teachers do not get sick.

Drinking fountains were turned off, and bottled water was brought in for the students. Paper products will be used at lunch so less water has to be boiled for cleanup. All ice made in school machines has to be thrown out, said Chris Menze, an environmental health specialist with the department.

Most homes in the area were not affected by the break, which occurred a few hundred yards south of Smith Valley Road on Mullinix Road, Reynolds said.

People who live in the homes affected by the break were given pamphlets that explain that they should use bottled liquids or boil water before using it for cooking, drinking or brushing teeth.

The Pointe shopping center, at County Line Road and State Road 135, has transferred its management from Welbourne Companies to CUSA LLC of Kennesaw, Ga., according to a news release.

CUSA, a property management company, will oversee the center, which includes J.L. Johnson Jewelers, Studio 135 and The Melting Pot.

Mike Duke, president and principal of Welbourne Companies and Duke Homes, purchased the property in 2002. The property had been vacant since a grocery store closed 14 years earlier.

Redeveloping the 43,000-square-foot shopping center was part of a revitalization project for the area, Duke said in the release.

"The evolution of The Pointe will continue to attract quality merchants to the southside of Indianapolis," the release said.

### New owners making changes to restaurant

The name of a Nineveh restaurant is the same, but its new owner said changes to the building and the menu are on the way.

Bob Mark bought the Olde Williamsburg Inn in July after more than two years of trying to negotiate its sale.

The restaurant has been vacant during the negotiations.

Mark, a Cordry-Sweetwater resident, plans to open the restaurant in March after the interior is remodeled with refinished wood from a Kentucky distillery.

Other renovations to the property include a 1,500-square-foot expansion with a new kitchen and bar area, he said. The new bar will be called the Stable.

Formerly the owner of two restaurants in Vincennes, Mark said he bought the property to draw customers from neighboring communities.

"We are going to be a different restaurant every day of the week," he said.

The restaurant will have special menus with only select items available during the evening meal featuring a nightly theme like Italian, fish or Mexican dishes.

Lunch menus will offer a variety of sandwiches, Mark said, and pizza will be available for carryout orders only.

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**GETTING INTO A REAL SCRAPE**

You may think that garlic is the culprit of your bad breath. It is true that this food is rapidly absorbed into the bloodstream.
