Roush completes deal with Red Sox owner

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla.
A group of investors led by Boston Red Sox owner John Henry has completed a deal to buy a 50 percent stake in the Roush Racing NASCAR team, a person familiar with the negotiations said Friday.
Although team owner Jack Roush is selling half of the team to the Fenway Sports Group, Roush will continue to run the team's competitive operations, according to the person, who requested anonymity because the deal hasn't been announced.
Both parties have scheduled a Wednesday news conference at Jackie Robinson Ballpark, a minor-league facility near Daytona International Speedway.
Roush, who was wearing his trademark fedora as he supervised his drivers at Daytona (Fla.) on Friday evening, declined comment.
Roush fields cars in the Nextel Cup series for Matt Kenseth, Greg Biffle, Jamie McMurray, Carl Edwards and David Ragan, and has won series championships with Kenseth and Kurt Busch.
An avid racing fan, Henry has been talking to Roush for several years about forming some sort of partnership. Henry is a co-

founder of iracing.com, a company that allows computer users to play online racing simulation games, and Henry is said to spend hours playing the games himself.
The deal represents a financial windfall for Roush, who started as a small drag racing team owner in the 1960s and entered NASCAR in 1988 with driver Mark Martin.
At NASCAR's preseason media tour last month, Roush said he needed additional funding to help his team develop the Car of Tomorrow and keep up with Toyota, which is entering the Cup series this year and is expected to drive up the cost of racing.
The deal also could help Roush attract more casual sports fans to NASCAR and allies the team with a group of well-heeled investors with a wealth of financial experience.
But even other NASCAR team owners acknowledge their business model isn't an automatic path to huge profits. Teams generally invest much of their profits into research and development.
Unlike teams in other sports, NASCAR doesn't award franchises to team owners. Because the sport is open to anybody who wants to start a team, existing teams aren't worth nearly as much as franchises in other sports, where the addition of a new team must be approved by the other franchise owners.

TORONTO — Chris Bosh had 29 points and 11 rebounds, Kobe Bryant missed a potential tying 3-pointer in the final seconds, and the Toronto Raptors won their season-high fifth straight against the Los Angeles Lakers.
Anthony Parker added 18 points, and Andrea Bargnani had 14 for the Atlantic Division-leading Raptors, who have won seven straight at home and 14 of 18 overall.
Bryant scored 25 points for the Lakers, who dropped to 3-4 on their eight-game road trip.
Bosh's layup gave Toronto an 86-75 lead with 5:41 left, but the Lakers followed with an 11-0 run to tie it.
After trading leads in the last two minutes, the Raptors were up 95-92 with 11 seconds left following free throws by Bosh and Anthony Parker.
Bryant faked out Jorge Garbajosa before putting up a shot from top of the key, but the ball hit off the rim. Bosh grabbed the rebound with 0.2 seconds left and made one of two free throws.
