Men take sting out of Yellow Jackets, have chance to top HCAC

With a shot at first place in the Heartland Conference on the line Thursday against Defiance, the Franklin College men's basketball team protected their home court with

an 88-77 victory. Grizzlies coach Kerry Prather said Franklin's 17-point defeat at Defiance on Jan. 17 was the tipping point for the players. Franklin shot 32 percent in that game, took shots that were not in the offensive flow and turned the ball

over for easy baskets in transition. On the bus ride home, Prather and the players met to discuss the team's strengths and weaknesses and vowed to make the necessary changes to become a first-place team.

It worked. Since that loss, Franklin (15-9 overall, 10-5 HCAC) has won eight of nine games, including six wins in eight road games. Thursday's home victory assured the Grizzlies a spot in the HCAC tournament.

"From that point on, we have played so much more disciplined," Prather

said of Franklin's loss to Defiance. "That's made all the difference. We're giving up some size and give up some rebounds to our opponents, but we've done more than hold our own."

Sophomore point guard Jace Redman had career highs in points (22) and 3-pointers (6-11). He hit several key shots that stopped Defiance runs, including a 3-pointer that put Franklin up 77-70 with 5:52 left in the

Prather said the player who won the matchup between Franklin junior forward Marty Young, who won Player of the Week honors last week, and 6-foot-8 Defiance center Anthony Pettaway would most likely propel his team to victory. Young got the best of the matchup, and despite giving up five inches to Pettaway, he seemed to have

the advantage for most of the game. Young finished with 18 points, Jon Neill scored 15, and Luke Tudor and Dustin Marshall each had 11 points.

Defiance was led by Nick Sales' 22 points and game-high 11 rebounds. Mike Floyd scored 18 points, and Pettaway finished with 16 points and five rebounds.

The Grizzlies will have the chance to tie for first place when they host Anderson (9-14, 2-12) at 3 p.m. Saturday. With a win and a Bluffton loss at Hanover, Franklin would win the conference outright and host the conference tournament at the

Spurlock Center on Feb. 23 and 24. "We can't control the Bluffton part, but we can certainly control our part. Anderson is one of those teams that caused us problems, and we had to fight to get out of there with our lives," Prather said. "But we're at the point in the season where it has less to do with who we're playing and more

to do with how we need to play. "I think that's been learned by the players and we'll be ready.'
