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Michigan judge: Former Pacer Jackson violated probation

ROCHESTER HILLS, Mich.

Golden State Warriors guard Stephen Jackson violated his probation in Michigan related to the infamous brawl at The Palace of Auburn Hills when Indiana prosecutors charged him with firing a gun outside a strip club, a judge ruled Friday.

Jackson was serving probation after pleading no contest to misdemeanor assault and battery charges in September 2005 for his role in the 2004 brawl between Indiana Pacers players and Detroit Pistons fans. He was charged in Indiana with criminal recklessness, a felony, and misdemeanor counts of battery and disorderly conduct.

Jackson, who was traded to Golden State earlier this month, faces up to 30 days in jail on the probation violation. But one of his lawyers, James Burdick, and assistant Oakland County prosecutor Paul Walton said District Court Judge Julie Nicholson likely will make a sentencing determination based on the outcome of the Indiana case.

For example, they said, Nicholson could order Jackson to perform community service rather than spend time in a Nicholson also resolved the restitu-

tion portion of Jackson's Palace case, ordering him to pay \$10,000 to fan

William Paulson, who also has sued Jackson and others in federal court. Jackson is accused of striking Paulson during the brawl.

After the hearing, Jackson said his court cases have not been a distraction to his play and he was looking forward to returning to the hardwood. Jackson and his new team, the Warriors, host Charlotte tonight.

"Glad to be done here," Jackson said.

Asked whether Jackson could face punishment from the NBA for the probation violation, league spokesman Brian McIntyre said Friday that the NBA was monitoring the situation. Police said Jackson fired a gun in

the air at least five times during an Oct. 6 fight outside Club Rio in Indianapolis. Jackson first told police he fired the gun in self-defense, but Marion County Prosecutor Carl Brizzi said Jackson retrieved his gun from his car and fired it before he was struck and injured by another car. He could go to trial in February.

Jackson was one of several Pacers who went into the stands and fought with Detroit fans during one of the worst brawls in U.S. sports history. Jackson was suspended 30 games and sentenced to a year of probation, community service and a fine.

"All that is behind me," Jackson said of the brawl.

Also on Friday, Nicholson released brawl participant Ron Artest from probation. Artest was hit with a cup filled with an icy beverage that night. The volatile player, who now is with the Sacramento Kings, bolted into the stands in a rage, followed by a fistswinging Jackson.

Indiana forward Jermaine O'Neal will be released from probation after he pays \$1,686.50 in restitution to Charlie Haddad, Nicholson also decided Friday. Authorities say O'Neal struck Haddad on the court as the Pistons fan struggled to get up from the floor.

Haddad, who had asked for thousands of dollars more in restitution, declined to comment afterward. In October, a federal jury dismissed a civil lawsuit by Haddad, who claimed he suffered migraine headaches and memory loss since the brawl.

Nazi-era 'grandfather of racecars' on display in New York before auction racing by putting the driver in front of Type won the 1939 French Grand Prix.

NEW YORK

A rare Nazi-era racecar hidden in a German mine shaft during World War II and said to be worth millions of dollars has gone on display.

The sleek silver D-Type from Audi forerunner Auto Union was on display through Friday at the car company's fancy showroom on Park Avenue. It will be auctioned as part of Christie's Retromobile auto sale Feb. 17 in Paris. The anonymous seller expects it to fetch \$12 million to \$15 million. While Adolf Hitler gave about 500,000

reichsmarks to Auto Union and Mercedes-Benz to promote racing and technology, the car is not specifically affiliated with the Third Reich, The car, one of only two in exis-

tence, is thought to be the grandfather of modern racecars. It revolutionized the engine instead of behind it and reached speeds up to 185 mph. "This car was really quite ahead of

its time," said Rupert Banner, head of Christie's International Motor Cars division. "It was revolutionary. It changed the face of racing." More than 20 Auto Union series

cars were built between 1933 and 1939. This model, which has a body shaped like an airplane fuselage, was designed by Ferdinand Porsche. The driver sits sunken into the body of the metal, and the wheels, which look like oversized bicycle tires, have independent suspension. "There was a kind of memory loss

after the war," said Audi historian Thomas Erdmann. "It took really until the early 1960s and later on to the 1980s for car design to catch up to these cars."

During the European motorsports heyday just before World War II, the D-

The Silver Arrow, as it was known, also was filmed winding through country roads for use in newsreels across Europe. In racing, German cars were always silver, British were racing green and French were blue. During World War II, Auto Union

workers hid the cars in a mine shaft in eastern Germany to avoid using them for scrap metal. After the war, the Russians discovered the cars and took them to their own country, along with dismantled Auto Union factories, to re-create motorsports.

"They vanished, lost behind the Iron Curtain." Erdmann said.

The cars eventually were taken apart. An American car collector came across car parts in a scrap heap in Ukraine and took them back to England, where experts Crosthwaite & Gardiner restored this car.

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
