Police: Drunk driver damaged homes

A motorist damaged property at 10 Center Grove area homes Wednesday night, police said.

A street sign, trees and utility boxes were knocked down, caus-

ing \$10,000 worth of damage in the Willow Lakes East subdivision, police said.

Jamie Jones, 28, 150 Harbor Court, Greenwood, was arrested on a charge of driving while intoxicated. She was accused of driving drunk in her sport utility vehicle, police said.

A Johnson County Sheriff's Office deputy pulled Jones over as she was trying to leave the scene, police said.

Her vehicle was heavily damaged and was found beside a broken street sign.

She told police she had one drink that afternoon.

Jones was taken to a police station to perform sobriety tests because she had a previously injured foot.

She failed all of the tests, according to the report.

Jones is being held at the Johnson County jail on \$3,000 bond.

While a student at Franklin College, Wilson married Mary Hugel of Shelbyville, Indiana.

Wilson went on to graduate from the Indiana Medical College and the School of Medicine of Purdue University at Indianapolis in 1907.

He later served with the Medical Corps of the American Expeditionary Force in Europe from 1917-1918.



As a reservist, he was promoted to the rank of captain in 1918 and to major in 1919.

Wilson practiced medicine in Evansville and Indianapolis until his death on August 4, 1943.

He was proud of his college heritage and seldom missed an Alumni Day or Homecoming event.
