## Hook-up fee set for sewer to new C-P bus garage

If you're building a home or business along part of Tracy Road in Whiteland, be prepared to pay an \$860 fee to help a school district earn back some of the money it spent bringing sewer service to the area.

An agreement with the town of Whiteland will allow Clark-Pleasant Community School Corp. to recover some of money spent to install the sewer line for its bus garage and maintenance center at Tracy Road and Front Street.

The 12-inch pipe was larger than the district needed for the facility, but it will allow for growth in Whiteland, director of facilities Jay Wise said.

Developers building new homes or businesses will pay \$861.70 to hook up to the sewer line, which

cost the district \$258,510 to install.

The price was determined based on the maximum number of homes or businesses that could use the wastewater pipe, which is 300.

The Clark-Pleasant facilities need 10 of the 300 available hookups, Wise said.

As many as 290 homes can hook up to the line. Businesses may need larger shares of access to the line.

The school district has 15 years to collect the hook-up fees. Developers will pay the town of Whiteland the fees, and then the money will be turned over to the school district, Wise said.

Any fees collected can be used for Clark-Pleasant building projects, he said.

The district came to an agreement with Whiteland this week, and the school board will have to approve it Tuesday, Wise said.
