Indiana State 68
Wichita State 63
TERRE HAUTE — Cole Holmstrom scored 16 points to lead Indiana State to a victory against Wichita State.
Marico Stinson had 13 points and Gabe Moore added 12 points for the Sycamores (11-4, 4-1 Missouri Valley Conference) in their sixth straight win.
Holmstrom hit three 3-pointers as Indiana State shot 11-of-23 (48 percent) from behind the arc.
A 3-pointer by Trent Wurtz with 9:03 left in the first half capped a 16-4 run for the Sycamores and gave Indiana State its largest lead of 12 points.
The Sycamores led 33-30 at halftime and never trailed in the second half.
P.J. Cousinsnard led Wichita State (10-6, 1-4) with 20 points and six rebounds. The Shockers had a 39-32 rebounding edge and outscored the Sycamores 44-14 in the paint, but never led by more than two points.
Michigan State 66
Northwestern 45
EAST LANSING, Mich. — Marquise Gray came off the bench to score 16 points and didn't miss a shot in 26 minutes to lift Michigan State past Northwestern.
Gray was 7 for 7 from the field and 2 for 2 at the line for the Spartans (14-4, 1-2 Big Ten). He scored just 13 points in Michigan State's losses last week at Iowa and Indiana.
Despite just 1-for-4 shooting in the

first half, Drew Neitzel had 18 points for the Spartans to lead all scorers and reach double-figures for the 17th game in a row.
Vince Scott scored 11 points for the Wildcats (10-6, 0-3), who lost to Michigan State for the 20th straight time in East Lansing and the 35th time in the past 37 meetings.
The Spartans trailed 5-2 when the 6-foot-8 Gray got the first of his five dunks. Michigan State surged from there and built a 32-22 halftime lead, thanks largely to a 21-4 edge in rebounds.
The final rebounding advantage was 37-13, with Drew Naymick grabbing six boards and four other players collecting five.
Louisville 81
South Florida 55
TAMPA, Fla. — Terrence Williams had 17 points and Brandon Jenkins scored 14 and keyed a decisive second-half surge Wednesday night, leading Louisville to a victory against South Florida.
The Cardinals (11-5, 1-1 Big East) rebounded from losing their conference opener 78-62 at Notre Dame, while South Florida (9-8, 0-3) has lost 18 of 19 Big East games since entering the league last season.
Jenkins made 5 of 6 six shots, including all four of his 3-point attempts, and scored eight straight points to thwart South Florida's last push to get back in the game early in the second half.
Edgar Sosa had 12 points and David Padgett and Jerry Smith added 11 apiece for Louisville, which started three guards and two forwards with Juan Palacios, the Cardinals' top frontcourt player, sitting out with an injury.
Kentrell Gransberry led South Florida with 19 points and eight rebounds. Melvin Buckley had 15 points for the Bulls.
South Florida was held to a pair of field goals by Gransberry in the first seven minutes of the game and never fully recovered.
The Bulls trimmed a 10-point deficit to six late in the first half, however. Louisville answered with Chris Current's 3-pointer and two free throws by Padgett to rebuild the lead to double figures.
It was 27-19 at the half, and the closest South Florida would get the rest of the way was four.

SOUTH BEND — Tulyah Gaines scored a career-high 27 points and Notre Dame forced 25 turnovers in an win against Cincinnati.
Gaines scored 17 in the second half and also had five assists and four steals while her backcourt mate Charel Allen scored 15 of her 19 points in the first half.
The Irish (11-4, 2-0 Big East), playing the first of four games in a 10-day stretch, remain one of just two teams still undefeated in Big East play, along with No. 7 Connecticut (3-0).
Treasure Humphries led Cincinnati (10-5, 1-3) with 15 points as the Bearcats lost back-to-back games for the first time this season and suffered their second straight double-digit setback. Cincinnati's 25 turnovers were a season-high.
