## Wall Street

NEW YORK — Stocks climbed for the third straight day Thursday as an already buoyant Wall Street embraced robust consumer spending figures and largely overcame disappointment in Google Inc.'s profit report.

The gains followed Wall Street's best day of the year Wednesday, when it advanced sharply after the Federal Reserve signaled that the economy remained solid and that inflation was mostly in check.

Economic data continued to play a big role in trading, as it has all week. As expected, consumer spending in December showed its biggest increase in five months, rising 0.7 percent.

"It seems to me the Fed is on hold for the foreseeable future and stocks are taking solace in that," said Brian Levitt, corporate economist for OppenheimerFunds Inc.

The Dow Jones industrial average advanced 51.99, or 0.41 percent, to 12,673.68. The session saw the blue chip average's 27th record close since the start of October, coming in well above the record of 12,621.77 set little more than a week ago, on Jan. 24.

A new trading high of 12,682.57 topped a day-old record of 12,657.02.

Broader stock indicators also showed strong gains. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 7.70, or 0.54 percent, to 1,445.94, and the Nasdaq composite index was up 4.45, or 0.18 percent, at 2,468.38.

The Russell 2000 rose 7.43, or 0.93 percent, to 807.77. The index first broke the 800 mark on Wednesday.

While Thursday's gains were smaller than those of Wednesday, the sessions resembled the somewhat heady times of the second half of 2006 when investors appeared more at ease with back-to-back days of sizable increases.

Bond prices fell as stocks carved their gains on fresh economic data, with the yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note rising to 4.83 percent from 4.82 percent late Wednesday. The dollar was mixed against other major currencies.





# Witness: Libby acknowledged possible discussion with Cheney

## WASHINGTON

Former vice presidential aide Lewis "Scooter" Libby acknowledged he may have discussed with Vice President Dick Cheney whether to tell reporters that a prominent war critic's wife worked at the CIA, an FBI agent testified Thursday.

Agent Deborah Bond's brief description of Libby's acknowledgment was about the only new information disclosed on the day.

Otherwise, Libby's perjury trial was devoted mostly to dealing with vigorous and repeated defense efforts to exclude evidence that Special Prosecutor Patrick Fitzgerald called "the guts of our case."

U.S. District Judge Reggie Walton accepted some defense arguments and rejected others during hours-long debates conducted outside the jury's presence.

But the government was able

to show the jury small portions of video of then-White House press secretary Scott McClellan saying President Bush would fire anyone who was found to have leaked classified information. The video also showed McClellan

saying he had been assured Libby did not leak classified information. McClellan spoke in October 2003, shortly before Libby was interviewed by the FBI.

Libby is charged with lying to the FBI and a grand jury about

his conversations with reporters concerning CIA operative Valerie Plame and obstructing an investigation of how her identity and CIA job were leaked to the press in 2003.

Fitzgerald said Libby's motive was to avoid being fired.

Libby's acknowledgment of a possible discussion with Cheney about revealing Plame's job is likely to have more impact on political debate about the Plame leak than on the trial because Libby is not charged with the actual leak.

The trial recessed until Monday before Bond was asked whether Libby described for the FBI details of his talk with Cheney or any decisions he and Cheney may have reached. Libby denies he leaked the name.

The legal arguments delayed the jury's entry into the courtroom until after 2 p.m. Jurors remained attentive even though Bond testified in a low, often halting monotone.

Bond said that during Libby's

second FBI interview in his office Nov. 23, 2003, Libby described flying back from Norfolk, Va., with Cheney on July 12, 2003, at the height of public controversy over allegations made by Plame's husband, former ambassador Joseph Wilson.

Libby told the FBI he went to the front of the plane to get a statement Cheney wanted released to the press. It denied Wilson's suggestion that Cheney was behind Wilson's trip to Niger in 2002 to investigate a report that Iraq was trying to buy uranium there for nuclear weapons.

Wilson had said in print and on television July 6, 2003, that he debunked the uranium report and Cheney should have known that long before Bush cited the uranium story in his January 2003 State of Union speech as a justification for war with Iraq.

Bond testified Libby told the FBI "there was a discussion whether to report to the press that Wilson's wife worked for the CIA."

Emerson told an Indianapolis police officer that Lucas Digital Graphics was manufacturing unlicensed Indianapolis Colts merchandise, the affidavit said.

On Monday, an Indianapolis police officer went to Lucas Digital Graphics and purchased a T-shirt with Colts and NFL logos and the statement "2006 AFC Conference Champions One Game One Dream."

Lucas Digital Graphics owner Morris Lucas could not be reached for comment Thursday. He and his wife already had left

for Florida to go to the Super Bowl.

The business was using the Colts horseshoe and name on hats, T-shirts, banners, jerseys, stickers and novelty license plates, Fillenwarth said.

A sign displayed on State Road 135 outside the business advertised Colts jerseys for \$29.95 and T-shirts for \$8. Licensed Colts jerseys on the team's Web site are advertised for \$74.99.

Detectives will go through the computers in the store to find all graphics being used illegally. Once illegal material has been removed, the business can reopen and produce legal items such as local schools' logos.

A business cannot print copyrighted symbols or phrases with-

out buying the licensing permission from the NFL.

The phrases "Indianapolis Colts," "Chicago Bears," "NFL" and "Super Bowl" all are copyrighted materials, Fillenwarth said.

Lucas Digital Graphics was printing the phrases and symbols with a copyright symbol underneath it, though the business did not have permission, he said.

Employees in the store told police they knew it was illegal to make the Colts items, Fillenwarth said.

Employees believed once law enforcement found out about it, the officers would just tell them to stop and give them minor punishment, he said.

"(People) don't realize it's a

ailable offense," he said.

An Indianapolis law firm representing the Colts has sent letters to area businesses warning them that the unauthorized use of Colts' logos or trademarks is strictly prohibited.

Emerson, an attorney with law firm Bose, McKinney and Evans, told police that as the Colts general counsel he has knowledge of copyright agreements with the Colts and NFL. He told police Lucas Digital Graphics is not licensed to produce Colts or NFL items, the affidavit said.

Fillenwarth expects the police department to make arrests in the case, but not immediately, he said.

Detectives have to go through all of the evidence first and fig-

ure out who is responsible for making the decision to print the items illegally, he said.

Police confiscated all items with Colts, Bears, Super Bowl or NFL symbols or words. Employees cooperated with police and acknowledged they were making Colts apparel and gear, Fillenwarth said.

All screen prints used to put the images on the shirts were taken as evidence, he said. When police arrived, one employee was preparing a screen print for a Colts and Bears dueling helmets shirt, Fillenwarth said.

Lucas Digital Graphics will likely be able to open next week after they copy legal graphics onto new computer hard drives, Fillenwarth said.
