Police: Man admits to stabbing himself

Prince's Lakes resident arrested after telling police he was injured during a robbery

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A Prince's Lakes man stabbed himself Sunday to get attention, police said.

David Manlove, 34, 968 W. Bauer Drive, Nineveh, told police Sunday that he was stabbed during an attempted robbery in Franklin.

Police arrested Manlove on Tuesday after he told them he stabbed himself and made up the robbery story, Franklin Police Chief John Borges said. Manlove was arrested on a charge of false

reporting of a crime, a Class A misdemeanor.

If convicted, Manlove would face up to a year in jail and a \$5,000 fine.

"This was a waste of our time and resources," Borges said. "While we understand problems people are going through, we

hope this individual is vigorously prosecuted to send a message."

Manlove went to his estranged wife's home Sunday evening with a serrated fish fillet knife jutting from his stomach. He told police a man stabbed him near Greenlawn Cemetery after demanding money. Manlove said he had stopped his car off U.S. 31 because his tire was making a noise.

Police dispatched the entire second shift — five patrol cars — to search the area, including neighborhoods, Province Park, the cemetery and nearby businesses. Manlove gave no description of a suspect, whom he said was on foot.

An evidence technician and detectives were called after hours onto the scene. The investigation Sunday also cost the police department overtime pay, he said.

Police found no suspect, evidence, crime scene or witnesses of an attempted robbery.

Manlove drove about seven miles to his wife's New Whiteland home with a cell phone in his pocket, police said. His wife called 911, and Manlove was taken to Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis. He was released Tuesday.

New Whiteland Detective Sgt. David Glaze said Manlove's

wound was shallow.

Police interviewed Manlove again after he was released from the hospital. He told a detective he made a false claim about an attempted robbery, police said.

Manlove told the detective he was seeking attention from family members, according to a news release.

False reports, though not common, mean fewer officers patrolling the streets and fewer detectives investigating legitimate crimes, Borges said.

Manlove is being held at the Johnson County jail on a \$2,000 bond.

CG schools honored for teacher tech training

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If teachers want to create a clay animation video at Center Grove schools, they now have the know-how to do it.

A staff development day in January gave teachers the chance to relearn some computer

knowledge and also advance their skills.

The training day, dubbed "No Teacher Left Behind: Technology Day" is now being recognized by the state. The district will be awarded a grant for \$2,000 in a ceremony conducted by Indiana Superintendent of Public Instruction Suellen Reed on Feb. 22.

A state-wide committee picked

the teacher training day for the grant, which brought in speakers and used local experts in computer technology. The day is being awarded for its effectiveness in teaching both basic skills and advanced technological practices to teachers, Center Grove Education Foundation Director Heidi Sighting said.

"Our main goal was for teach-

ers to be able to use the things they learned with students immediately," said Center Grove Middle School North teacher Angie Teed, who helped plan the day.

Teachers had the option to take classes in the basics, to brush up in applications such as Microsoft Word or PowerPoint.

But more importantly, they

could take workshops to advance their computer knowledge and apply it in the classroom. Sessions were available for teachers to learn deeper Internet research, advanced computer graphs and probes, and even claymation.

Three hour-long sessions took place and teachers had 57 options to choose from.
