

Defense does job for Trojans

he most recent time the Center Grove girls basketball team was crowned sectional champion, the Trojans averaged nearly 70 points a game. How things have changed since 2001. Now the Trojans, who are

regional at Southport, rely on defense. This season, Center Grove has held 15 of its 23 opponents to fewer than 50 points. Not surprisingly, the Trojans have won all 15 of those games.

"We preach defense throughout our program. From the time they come into camp in the third grade, we're talking defense all the time," Center Grove coach Joe Lentz said.

"This group has quickness and

desire, and you can play defense if you have those two things, and they take pride in it."

Heading into the regional game against Class 4A No. 8-ranked Ben Davis, Center Grove is limiting its opponents to 45.1 points a game, the lowest total for the Trojans in at least seven years.

"We're really cocky about or defense. That's what makes us so good," senior Gina Phillips said. "Our team is mostly seniors, and we've been playing together since the seventh grade, and aggressive defense is our game. We're very confident in our defense.'

Statistics provide the evidence for balance. Three Warriors average double figures in scoring.

Laughter and smiles during practices and team gatherings illustrate the chemistry.

"We're just a bunch of silly girls," senior Brittney Wilson said. "We're outgoing, crazy, and you really don't know what to expect. We joke around, and we're not really serious often. It gets under Hogue's nerves a lot."

Wilson said winning allows the girls some leeway with their coach. Plus,

Hogue has gotten used to it. Four of the team's five starters have

been starters for at least three years. Seniors Amy Orender, Rusti White and Wilson were inserted into the

starting lineup five games into their freshmen year, and junior Sarah Condra joined them a year later. Senior Jennifer Harriman, who began this season as a starter, also was a varsity contributor as a freshman.

Boilers roll to victory

Victory against IU should help tourney hopes

David Teague scored a careerhigh 32 points as Purdue beat No. 24 Indiana 81-68 on Thursday night to snap a five-game losing streak in the intrastate rivalry.

Teague made 11 of 18 field goals, including 6 for 8 from 3-point range. He also had seven rebounds.

Carl Landry added 22 points and 11 rebounds, and Tarrance Crump added 13 points for Purdue (17-9, 6-6 Big Ten).

D.J. White scored 20 points, Armon Bassett scored 16, and Roderick Wilmont added 15 for Indiana (17-7, 7-4).

Purdue improved to 14-1 at home and boosted its NCAA Tournament hopes with its second win over a ranked team this season. The Boilermakers shot 50 percent from the field and outrebounded the Hoosiers 32-28.

Indiana won the previous meeting 85-58 on Jan. 10 in Bloomington. The Hoosiers had won eight of the previous 10 games in the series.

The game was moved from Wednesday to Thursday because of wintry weather that slowed travel throughout Indiana.

CG wrestler not backing down from foe in finals

Center Grove High School wrestler Blake Harvey calls his wrestling style unorthodox.

Trojans coach Cale Hoover calls it funky. Whatever it is, it's working.

Harvey, who will compete in tonight's first round of the IHSAA individual state wrestling finals at Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis, will look to use his unique scrambling style to become Center Grove's first state place winner since Jeremy VanAlstyne won the heavyweight championship in 2002.

"Wrestling is the kind of sport where there are very few things that are cut and dried, right and

wrong," Harvey, a senior, said. "There is a perfect breaststroke in swimming and a perfect pass in football. In wrestling, that's not so much the case.

"It's whoever wants to get it done the most. My style is a little bit off the beaten path. Some of my techniques have led to some bad habits, but we've corrected them this year."

Hoover, in his first season at Center Grove, said he knew Harvey had the potential to be a state finalist the first time he saw him perform. But he also knew the wrestler had some kinks to work out.

"We wanted to keep working on the fundamentals and take advantage of all the unique abilities he
