

It wouldn't seem possible, but this is yet another fractured fairy tale in which the characters subvert their own genre in self-conscious, smartalecky fashion.



There's plenty of depth to the races themselves, whether you are doing standard time-based races or going against a boss in order to overtake his turf.


"Carbon" is a solid and enjoyable game on any of the platforms, but it lacks punch on the Wii because the con-


