# Nashville fire ruled arson

## Investigators: Blaze was not an accident

### NASHVILLE, Ind.

A fire that destroyed much of a rustic lodge near the Brown County State Park was intentionally set, the state fire marshal said Thursday.

Investigators ruled out all accidental causes for the Jan. 2 fire at the 80-room Seasons Lodge and Conference Center, state Fire Marshal Roger Johnson said.

He declined to say what evidence pointed to arson.  
 "The sensitivity of this case is

such that we cannot," Johnson said.  
 Investigators will present their evidence to the Brown County

prosecutor on Friday, he said.

Johnson asked that anyone with information on the fire call the arson tip line at (800) 382-4628.

No one was injured in the fire, which was reported about 3 a.m. at the two-story, country-style lodge about 20 miles east of Bloomington.

A hotel clerk who smelled smoke alerted the 18 guests, some of whom fled to safety wearing only their pajamas.

Dak Kelp, chief of the Brown County Volunteer Fire Department, said the fire at the hotel, which is four separate buildings connected by stairways and breezeways, took firefighters more than three hours to bring under control.

He said the fire destroyed about a third of the two-story hotel, gutting two buildings that held guests' rooms. But the remaining area, including the lounge, dining room, a conference hall and a housing unit, was not damaged.

# Keep an eye out for traffic-light changes

If you turn left off U.S. 31 in Greenwood, pay extra attention beginning next week.

Several simultaneous left-hand-turn lights are being eliminated Monday, including those at the intersections of County Line Road, the Greenwood Park Mall entrance, Fry Road, Main Street, Smith Valley Road and Stop 18 Road will be eliminated starting Monday.

Transportation is changing the timing to improve traffic flow, spokesman Marvin Jenkins said.

Once the changes are made, left-hand turns can be made only at the beginning or end of a

green light for traffic going straight. That means drivers not making turns won't have to wait on drivers from the opposite direction making left-hand turns.

Northbound traffic, including those making left-hand turns on U.S. 31, will go first. After a brief period, only north and southbound traffic will have a green light. Northbound traffic will then be stopped to allow drivers heading south to make left turns.

Drivers might have a blinking red light at the intersections while the transportation department changes the timing devices, but

there should be no major interruptions to traffic. The changes will be made over a three-day period next week, weather permitting, Jenkins said.

"People are going to have to pay attention to their own individual signal," he said. "They should not try to anticipate based on what the other lanes of traffic are doing."

A study of traffic flow on U.S. 31 in Greenwood in December prompted the change. Because traffic won't be completely stopped to allow for only simultaneous left-hand turns, drivers should notice less congestion, he said.

Members of the Senate homeland security, transportation and veterans affairs committee will listen to public comment about the project before voting on whether the bill should go to the full Senate.

Anyone interested in giving the 11 lawmakers feedback can go to the Senate Chambers, located on the third floor of the statehouse at 200 W. Washington St., Indianapolis.

Officials from the state department of transportation will travel to Franklin College at 6 p.m. to hear public comment and feedback about the beltway.

People who want to give their input can go to the Branigin Room, located on the second floor of the Napolitan Student Center.
