Police: Suspect broke into home after accident

A southside man broke into a woman's Greenwood home Sunday to hide from police after leaving the scene of an accident, police said.

The resident said the man kicked in the rear door of her house and asked to be hidden from the police, according to a police report.

Renzo Figueroa, 19, 10716 Tanbark Drive, Indianapolis, failed an alcohol breath test administered during his arrest, according to a probable cause affidavit.

The other driver in the accident, who suffered a cut on his head, told police the man ran off. Police searched the neighborhood and spotted a man running through yards, according to the probable cause affidavit. A woman told police that Figueroa was in her home.

When officers located Figueroa, they smelled alcohol on his breath, the affidavit said. Police gave him a breath test that showed a blood-alcohol level of .14, nearly twice the legal limit for operating a vehicle, the affidavit said.

Police arrested Figueroa on

charges of driving under the influence, consumption of alcohol by a minor, leaving the scene of a personal injury accident, criminal trespass, resisting arrest, invasion of privacy and stalking, stemming from an altercation a week before.

Figueroa violated a restraining order Feb. 4, police said. Figueroa was the subject of two complaints that day for harassing a Greenwood woman at the mall and later attempting to break into her home, according to a probable cause affidavit.

Figueroa was released from Johnson County jail on \$16,000 bond.

Two Republicans to run for city judge seat

The Greenwood city judge will be challenged for his seat in the primary election this May. Stephanie S. Caraway, a

Republican, has filed to run for the city court judge position.

Incumbent Lewis J. Gregory, also a Republican, is seeking reelection to the job he started in 1996.

Caraway works as an assistant supervisor at the Marion County Prosecutor's Office. She is a former deputy prosecutor for both Johnson and Marion counties.

She said she wants to study ways to make the court run more efficiently, save money and to promote community involvement in the court.

"I really think some cuts can be made while focusing on the integrity of the court," she said.

Gregory started the Greenwood Recovery Court, a strict 12-month program intended to change the behavior of substance abusers and keep them out of jail.

The primary election is May 8, and the general election is Nov. 6. Candidates can file for the primaries until noon Feb. 23.

Minutes

Johnson County Council

Monday, the council:
• Voted 7-0 to raise the Superior Court 2 assistant court reporter's pay by \$1,020 to \$26,524

• Approved 7-0 shifting \$3,742 in pay from a surveyor position to a senior subdivision inspection position. The county plans to leave one vacant surveyor position unfilled unless more houses are built.

• Voted 7-0 to shuffle a magistrate court bailiff to an assistant court reporter. The sheriff's office will now handle security instead of the bailiff. The sheriff's office will use a fund of \$5,187

to pay any necessary overtime incurred due to security.

School boards

Center Grove Community School Corp.

Monday, the board:

• Voted 5-0 to allow the administration to negotiate a lease with T-Mobile to erect a cell tower near the Bargersville Water Tower by the Bantam football fields. The board asked for the cell tower to be built as close to the water tower as possible, near the intersection of Whiteland Road and County Road 144.

• Voted 5-0 to conduct two hearings and adopt a resolution to receive a patron's petition to pay Center Grove's portion of the additions and renovations at Central Nine Career Center. Center Grove will pay about \$6 million for its part of the work at the vocational school.

• Approved 5-0 year-end transfers including moving \$186,952 to the Rainy Day Fund. These funds were appropriated to be used to pay architect fees that have accrued while work has been done for the high school expansion project. About \$40,000 in outstanding bills currently exists for InterDesign Architects, said Paul Gabriel, chief financial officer for Center Grove.

• Voted 5-0 to transfer balances from other school accounts that were not used at the end of the year to the district's account for capital projects

• Approved 5-0 a change order to the work on the bus garage and maintenance center for \$25,664. The money will pay for unforeseen costs associated with a permit.

Franklin Community School Corp.

Monday, the board:

• Approved 7-0 a \$290,790 bid to buy three new school buses from Midwest Transit

• Voted 7-0 to increase the pay rate for instructors who teach students at home due to special needs

• Tabled a request to allow the Franklin Historic Greenway Trail to build trails on eastside property owned by the district, which was the original proposed site for the new high school
