The Trojans, who were state runners-up a year ago, were led by sophomore Katelyn Fernandes, senior Megan Roller and junior Adrienne Cristofoli. "It's a weight off all of our shoulders," Trojans coach Eric Howe said of the season opener. "I'm very pleased. It was a good first meet, and we had some first-meet jitters, but the girls really pulled through."

Fernandes won the all-around competition with a score of 36.975, which included wins on the vault, beam and a first-place tie in the floor event. Roller tied Fernandes for first in the floor event with a score of 9.15 and took first place on the uneven bars on the way to finishing second in the all-around competition. Cavaliers 82 Spurs 78

CLEVELAND — LeBron James scored 19 points, Larry Hughes added 18 and the Cleveland Cavaliers' defense smothered and frustrated San Antonio during a rugged win against the Spurs. Damon Jones made two 3-pointers and four free throws in the final 1:35 as the Cavs, who have struggled on the road, improved to 14-3 at home and beat the Spurs for the second time this season.

They did so by harassing San Antonio all 94 feet, holding the NBA's second-most accurate shooting team to just 38 percent from the field and only 10 points in the third quarter. Jones scored all 11 points of his points in the fourth, and Anderson Varejao added seven rebounds, including four on the offensive end when he outthusted and outmuscled San Antonio's big man under the basket. Tony Parker led the Spurs with 26 points — 14 in the fourth — and Tim Duncan had 18 points and 15 rebounds.

San Antonio played the final six minutes without coach Gregg Popovich, who was assessed two technical fouls and was ejected following a wild sequence. Assistant coach P.J. Carlesimo ran the club down the stretch.

Magic 91 Clippers 86

ORLANDO, Fla. — Jameer Nelson made four free throws in the final 28 seconds and scored a season-high 29 points in the Orlando Magic's 91-86 victory against the Los Angeles Clippers. Dwight Howard had 14 points and 14 rebounds for the Magic, who gave up only two field goals to the

No. 5 Duke 73 Temple 55

DURHAM, N.C. — Josh McRoberts had a career-high 21 points and grabbed nine rebounds to lead No. 5 Duke past Temple 73-55 on Tuesday night. DeMarcus Nelson scored 14 points and had a career-best 11 rebounds for the Blue Devils (13-1), who extended the nation's longest nonconference home winning streak to 51 games.

Duke won for the seventh straight time in the series with Temple (6-6) and has won nine consecutive games overall. The 6-foot-10 McRoberts finished with an all-around strong performance, tallying four blocks and four assists in 32 minutes.

The Blue Devils got solid contributions from reserves David McClure (career-high 12 rebounds) and 7-foot freshman Brian Zoubek, who scored eight first-half points that helped Duke push ahead for good. Freshman Jon Scheyer led the defensive effort on Temple's Dionte Christmas, who came in as the

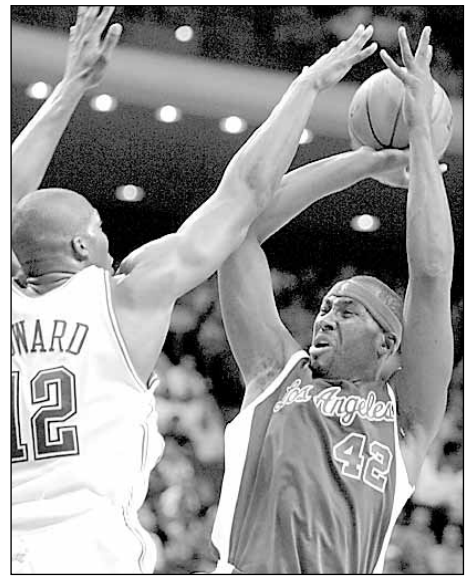
Up next for the Trojans is a trip to the Valparaiso Invitational on Saturday.

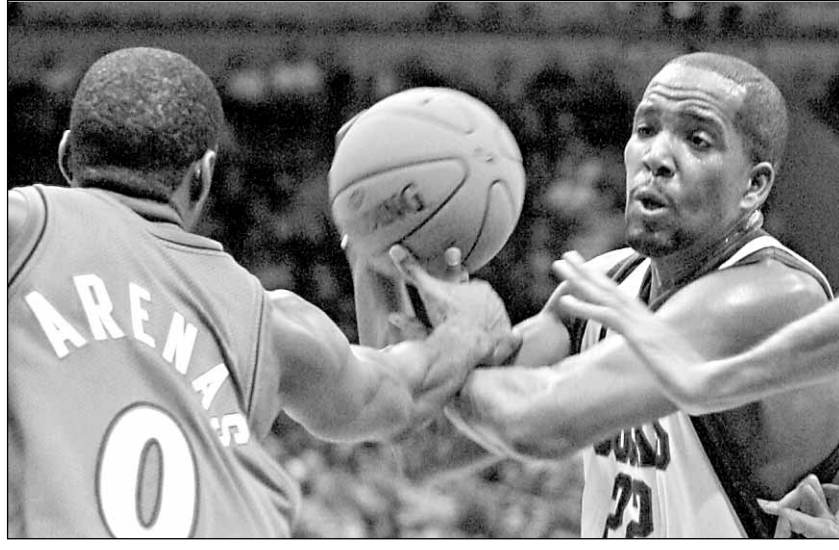
The player of the month is planning the birthday party of the year.

Before getting to that, it also should be noted that Gilbert Arenas offered his feelings Tuesday on Kobe Bryant, All-Star ballot stuffing, MySpace, U.S. national team rejection, the NBA's switch to the old ball, his sore shoulder, the evolution of his stardom and what it feels like to play for the most exciting team this side of the Arizona desert.

All in a 30-minute conversation. "Hey," the Washington Wizards point guard said with his usual bright smile, "I'm a character." Arenas can't string two sentences together without revealing one of his many quirks, and his stories are in demand more than ever after a December in which he averaged 34.1 points and set a franchise record with 60 against the Los Angeles Lakers, leading the high-scoring Wizards (107.7 points per game) into a battle for first place in the Southeast Division and putting himself into the race for the scoring title. "We're entertaining," Arenas said. "We've been entertaining for a while now, and it's been good for us to get some recognition." Arenas was named the league's

"Once he gets comfortable, he steals the show. That's his personality." Arenas had no problem stealing the show from Bryant with the 60-point game at the Staples Center on Dec. 17. Bryant seemed to belittle the feat afterward, saying Arenas took "awful" shots and "doesn't seem to have much of a conscience."
