Pacers hold on to win in double OT

INDIANAPOLIS

A day that began with indictments ended in a victory for the Indiana Pacers.

It was a bittersweet way to return from the All-Star break, probably more bitter than sweet in light of how hard the Pacers had to work against a struggling opponent.

Taking the court just a few hours after a grand jury indicted Pacers players Jamaal Tinsley and Marquis Daniels on misdemeanor and felony charges stemming from a fight at a westside bar, Indiana earned a 136-129 double overtime win Wednesday night against the visiting Milwaukee Bucks.

Indiana (29-24), which led by double figures much of the first half, failed to put the Bucks (19-36) away in the second half, setting the stage for both overtimes.

Tinsley and Daniels, who were expected to turn themselves in to arresting authorities after the game, both played important roles in the outcome.

Tinsley started the game and finished with 11 points. He was 4 of 14 from the field but contributed a game-high 11 assists. Daniels played 35 minutes off the bench and scored 22 points on 10-of-16 shooting.

Overall, Jermaine O’Neal and Danny Granger led the way for Indiana with 29 and 26 points, respectively. O’Neal also had a game-high 15 rebounds. Granger had seven rebounds, three steals and three blocked shots.

Starters Troy Murphy and Mike Dunleavy also were solid for the Pacers. Dunleavy had 16 points on 7-of-14 shooting. Murphy had 19 points and 10 rebounds.

“A little too much entertainment for the dollar,” Pacers coach Rick Carlisle said. “It was huge to get the win. We hung on in the second overtime ... they’re a very dangerous team when you let them hang around.”

For Milwaukee, Michael Redd led the way with a game-high 38 points. Mo Williams had 24, and Charlie Bell added 21. Andrew Bogut added 19 points and six rebounds.

For Tinsley and Daniels, the night didn’t end when the game did.

Both players, according to their lawyers, were expected to be released on their own

way to give due process time to work. “In our system of justice, grand juries do not find anyone guilty of anything,” the statement said.

“We need to give the process time to treat everyone fairly and reach a just result. The Pacers hope the media and the public will join with us in affording the presumption of innocence to Jamaal and Marquis. The Pacers believe due process requires it.”

No one was immediately arrested or charged after the fight, which happened hours after a home loss to Golden State. Instead, a grand jury was convened to examine the evidence and decide whether charges should be filed.

According to the police report, the bar manager said Tinsley threatened to kill him during the fight. The confrontation with the players followed another fight involving a person who employees thought was trying to steal coats from the coat check area, police said.

Pacers players yelled obscenities at staff members, the report said.

At some point, Tinsley punched bar manager Mark Nicholson, 42, on the left side of his head, knocking him to his knees, the report said. Nicholson said Daniels and another man began striking him in the face.
