Woods hurt by poor putting, falls short in Dubai Classic

Exasperated by his poor putting, Tiger Woods headed home after one of those rare weeks in which he did not win a tournament.

He finished two strokes behind winner Henrik Stenson in third place Sunday, unable to make a successful title defense at the Dubai Desert Classic before a gallery that included Roger Federer and Michael Schumacher.

Woods can take consolation in knowing his streak of seven straight victories on the PGA Tour is still alive, but he knows there's work ahead.

"That's one of the worst putting weeks I've had in a long time," said Woods, who shot a 3-under-par 69 to finish at 17-under 271. "I'm going to go home and just kind of figure it out."

Stenson (68) beat the day two shots behind Ernie Els (71) at Emirates Golf Club. But Stenson, a Swede who lives in Dubai, had five birdies to finish at 269. Els was a shot back, and Woods shared third with Niclas Fasth (68).

Hings cruises to fifth Pan Pacific Open in two sets

Martina Hings won her record fifth Pan Pacific Open title Sunday, beating 19-year-old Ana Ivanovic 6-4, 6-2.

Hings, who lost to Elena Dementieva in the final last year, relied on solid groundstrokes to beat the fifth-seeded Serb in just over an hour.

"It's twice as sweet to win the second time around," Hings said of her return to competitive tennis in 2006. "It used to be so normal back in '97 and '98. This time around I feel like I really deserve it, I feel more proud to win now and it's my more special."

Hings, who won in 1997, 1999, 2000 and 2002, broke a tie with Lindsay Davenport for the most titles in the event.

Ivanovic advanced to the final when top-ranked Maria Sharapova was forced to retire during their semifinal match because of a hamstring injury.

Tied 4-4 in the first set, Hings made 14 straight points to take control of the set and the match.

Even-par round gives Webb Women's Australian Open title

Karrie Webb captured her third Women's Australian Open title, shooting an even-par 72 in the final round Sunday for a six-stroke win.

Webb, who began with a four-stroke lead over Wei Yun-jye of Taiwan, finished with a 10-under 278 total at Royal Sydney. Wei shot 74 to finish second at 4 under.

"Hopefully, it's a good start to a good year," Webb said. "Obviously, four days ago I would've been happy to sit in the clubhouse at 2-under, so it exceeded my expectations to finish at 10-under on a very good golf course."

Paula Marti of Spain and Minea Blomqvist of Finland each shot 69 to finish tied for third at 2 under.

Brittany Lincicome of the United States and Shin Ji-yai of South Korea also had 69s, finishing another shot back.

Katherine Hull of Australia shot a 7-under 65, the best round of the day, to move into ninth place.

Ivanovic double-faulted three times in the first game of the second set and never recovered as Hings raced to a 4-0 lead.

Baghdatis beats Ljubicic to win Zagreb Open

Marcos Baghdatis won his second career title Sunday by beating defending champion Ivan Ljubicic 7-6 (4), 4-6, 6-4 at the Zagreb Open.

The second-seeded Cypriot saved four break points in the opening set, one with an ace and two others with service winners.

In the tiebreaker, Baghdatis took a 5-1 lead, but Ljubicic rallied to close the gap to 5-4.

"Ljubicic is a tough player to break, but I was concentrated and served well when I needed to," Baghdatis said. "It's not easy to beat Ljubicic in front of his home crowd in Croatia."

Ljubicic, who lost in the first round of the Australian Open nine days after winning the Qatar Open, broke Baghdatis in the fifth game and won the second set.
