

Cubs prevail on 'Pack the House' night in old gym



Trojans hope to learn from loss

Bears 64, Trojans 60

INDIANAPOLIS
Center Grove High School boys basketball coach Cliff Hawkins didn't get a victory Friday night at Lawrence Central.

Instead, he had to settle for a furious second-half rally that fell just short and a textbook-teaching example for the postseason of how the Trojans need to play with passion from tip to buzzer.

The host Bears' 64-60 victory was much tighter throughout the fourth quarter than the final score indicated and ended with their students storming the court and Center Grove falling for only the third time all year.

"It was a great battle at the end, but we lost the game in the first half when we weren't aggressive enough," Hawkins said. "We have a great opportunity to grow from this challenge."

The Trojans (17-3) open sectional play Wednesday at 6 p.m. at Franklin Community High School against Greenwood.

Lawrence Central (10-9) jumped on Center Grove early, building a double-digit lead three times in the first half by controlling the boards and disrupting the Trojans with a physical defensive presence.

The Bears made seven of their first nine shots.

The Trojans missed 14 in a row following Corey Gray's 3-pointer opened the scoring.

Center Grove started gnawing away at the lead in the second half when it altered its offensive philosophy to feature more drives to the basket from senior guard Tyler Kitchel.

'I abhor our public image'

Pacers CEO Donnie Walsh hopes fans will embrace new players

Mediocre records, the 2005 brawl in Detroit and recent legal issues have cast a cloud over the Indiana Pacers franchise.

A gun-waving fight outside a strip club stole headlines earlier in the season, and the team responded by making the NBA's largest trade of the season, sending Al Harrington and Stephen Jackson to Golden State. But off-the-court issues didn't subside with the roster overhaul.

This week, guards Jamaal Tinsely and Marquis Daniels were criminally charged related to a Feb. 6 incident in which a nightclub owner was struck in the face.

Pacers President and Chief Executive Officer Donnie Walsh sat down with The Daily Journal on Friday to talk about a number of issues, including the team's public image and Walsh's future with the franchise.

Question: Have you been pleased with the results of the big trade?

Answer: Yes, so far. I like the players we got. I think they have a future with the franchise. I do think they fit in with what we need now. We have to get better in order to compete at the highest levels in the NBA.

They may be building steps to win this year, but they are definitely building steps to win in the future.

Q: How necessary was a shake-up of the roster?


A: I think that we recognized last year that we didn't like our team and the way it performed on the floor; the way it acted on the court or off the court.

So that's why we made the changes we did during the summer. Then when the incident happened earlier this year with Club Rio, I think we felt like we want guys here that are professional,

that understand what it is and can fit in with the value system of this city. And I think that's why we made the Golden State trade.

We wouldn't just make any trade, but that trade gave us players that fit in with us and hopefully they do understand what it is to be a professional athlete, both with their play on the court, the way they act on the

Raptors take out frustrations by downing Pacers

TORONTO

The Toronto Raptors were determined to rebound from a disappointing loss against one Eastern Conference playoff team with a victory against another.

Chris Bosh had 23 points and 12 rebounds to lead the Raptors to a 110-88 rout against the Indiana Pacers on Friday night.

Jorge Garbajosa added 16 points for the Raptors, who allowed Wednesday's game against Cleveland to slip away.

The Raptors never trailed against Indiana and their biggest lead was 27 points.

"We wanted to come out and make a statement. We definitely allowed one to get away from us the other night against Cleveland," point guard T.J. Ford. "We're competing to get top spot in the East and we think we're capable of doing it."

Toronto has won nine of its past 10 at home. The
