The Center Grove boys basketball team breathed a collective sigh of relief after a frantic finish and 10th straight win.

Senior guard Louis Kamo's 3-point play late in the game helped the Trojans hold off visiting Brownsburg 50-47.

The Trojans (11-1) were averaging 65 points per game, while the Bulldogs (9-6) were putting up only 46 points a game but had won five of their past six before Saturday's loss.

Center Grove had a 22-21 lead at halftime and led 34-33 at the end of the third period.

Senior center Andrew Bowman's 12 points led the Trojans, while Kamo added 11 and junior Corey Gray had 10.

Visiting Franklin College saw its 16-game winning streak against Bluffton University come to an end in a 78-70 Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference women's basketball game Saturday.

The game was tight throughout the first half, and Franklin (11-6 overall, 5-4 in the HCAC) led for six minutes, with its biggest lead being seven points.

But the Beavers (5-13 overall, 3-6 HCAC) fought back and took a six-point edge heading into the intermission.

Lindsay Bush, who shot 9 of 13 from the field, had 25 points and 14 rebounds to lead the Beavers. Other double-digit scorers were Angie Lee with 17, Amanda Bell with 14 and Lindsay Ebbeskotte with 10 points.

The Grizzlies had three players in double digits: junior guard Courtney Swain contributed 18 points, senior center Katie Douglas scored 13, and freshman forward Leslie Kingseed had 11. Junior forward Jennifer Redicker had 13 rebounds and two points.

The Grizzlies' next game is an HCAC contest against visiting Hanover at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Purdue's Katie Gearlds is almost as familiar with Indiana's Assembly Hall as her coach.

Unbeaten on the Hoosiers' home court in her four years with the Boilermakers, Gearlds scored 21 points, 15 of them in the first half, in an 81-58 victory Sunday.

The game marked the return of Purdue coach Sharon Versyp, who left the Hoosiers in April to take over the Boilermakers.

Purdue (18-3, 7-0 Big Ten) scored the first 10 points, took a 38-24 lead at halftime, built it to as many as 23 points midway through the second half and never led by fewer than 17 points after that.

Lindsay Wisdom-Hylton added 15 points and 10 rebounds for the Boilermakers.

Indiana (13-7, 2-5) was led by Whitney Thomas with 17 points and Nikki Smith with 13.
