# Purdue seniors go out in style

### **WEST LAFAYETTE**

Katie Gearlds scored 28 points, and Erin Lawless added 18 to help No. 15 Purdue beat Iowa 76-52 Thursday night.

The two seniors closed their home careers in style.

Gearlds made 11 of 20 shots from the field in her first game since scoring a school-record 41 points at Wisconsin. Lawless had career highs of 13 rebounds and five steals and notched her second double-double of the season.

Both received standing ovations when they left the game with just

under three minutes remaining. Kristi Smith led Iowa with 11 points but was held scoreless in the second half.

Purdue (24-5 overall, 13-2 in the Big Ten) lost two of its previous three home games, including a 54-52 loss to Michigan State. The Boilermakers prevented another loss by shooting 48 percent from the field.

Iowa (13-15, 5-10) committed 27 turnovers. The Hawkeyes were guaranteed a losing regular season and fell to 0-6 against ranked

Purdue led 43-36 early in the second half before three consecutive baskets by Gearlds bumped the lead to 49-36. Purdue later went on an 8-0 run to take a 57-38 lead and led by as many as 25 points in the second half.

#### No. 2 Tennessee 75 Arkansas 68, 0T

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — Candace Parker scored 29 points, and No. 2 Tennessee dodged a huge upset bid with an overtime win at Arkansas.

Tennessee led 62-59 with less than 15 seconds left in regulation when Arkansas was forced to foul Shannon Bobbitt. She missed the front end of a one-and-one, and Arkansas rebounded. Dominique Washington's 3-pointer missed, but the ball was knocked back to Washington, who made an open 3pointer to tie it at 62. Parker's long shot at the end of regulation rimmed out.

### No. 4 North Carolina 96 Wake Forest 47

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — Camille Little scored 19 points, and Ivory Latta had 14 to help No. 4 North Carolina cruise past Wake Forest.

Latta was just 4 for 14 from the floor and spent the final minutes of the first half in the trainer's room after taking an elbow to the eye but returned to start the second half. The two seniors exited to a standing ovation and a chant of "Thank you, seniors" at the 4:37 mark.

The Tar Heels (27-2, 11-2 in the ACC) took an early 18-3 lead, then took it to 29-5 thanks largely to their relentless pressure defense. UNC had 13 steals in the first half, led by Latta's four and Little's three.

#### No. 5 Ohio State 78 Penn State 61

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Jessica Davenport scored 26 points, and Ashlee Trebilcock had 17 to help No. 5 Ohio State beat Penn State to clinch at least a share of its third Big Ten title in a row.

The Buckeyes (25-2, 14-1) lead Purdue by a game with only their regular-season finale at Michigan on Sunday. Star Allen added 22 points for the Buckeyes, who captured a piece of their 10th

FORT WAYNE — Ryan Toolson scored 16 points off the bench to lead Utah Valley State past IPFW.



Tiger Woods had an easy time advancing Thursday in the Accenture Match Play Championship.

And with Jim Furyk, Phil Mickelson and the other top seeds no longer around, his road to an eighth straight PGA Tour victory started looking easier, too.

Woods was 5-up through six holes and never serious challenged by Tim Clark, the South African recovering from a neck injury and playing his first tournament of the year. The result was a 5-and-4 victory, the shortest match of the second round.

Mickelson's up-and-down West Coast Swing came to an end with a 3-and-1 loss to Justin Rose.

Chad Campbell pulled off a valiant rally against Furyk, making an 18-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole to go overtime, then twoputting from 50 feet for birdie to win in 19 holes.

That left Woods, the No. 1 seed, as the only player among the top eight seeds still around.

### FCC investigating deal between MLB, DirecTV

The government is investigating a proposed deal between Major League Baseball and DirecTV Inc.

MLB reportedly seeks to strike an exclusive deal with the satellite television provider to offer its "Extra Innings" baseball package. Disclosure of the Federal Communications Commission's investigation of any such deal came in a letter from FCC chairman Kevin Martin that Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., released Thursday.

The programming option allows baseball fans who live outside the markets of their favorite teams to watch them play for an extra fee. It is currently available to a number of cable and satellite television providers.

Kerry had asked Martin to investigate the "proposed \$700 million television deal that could deny many consumers the ability to watch their favorite teams."

Martin, in reply, wrote Kerry: "I share your concerns regarding this proposed deal."

Beginning today at 11 a.m. at the Meijer on Southport Road, Colts officials will take it on a "World Championship Trophy Tour" for about a month around 50 locations in Indiana, Illinois

and Kentucky. Stops later on the tour in March adjacent to Johnson County include Shelbyville, Columbus and Martinsville.

Fans can have photographs taken with the trophy and even reach inside a clear plastic case that is open at the top to touch it.

Tom Zupancic, the Colts' vice president of sales and marketing, said Irsay hopes that the top of the trophy becomes dull from all the contact from fans' hands.

Dungy said Irsay first spoke to him about the idea last week, and within that short time, the Colts' sales and marketing staff selected 50 locations for the tour that would make getting an up-close view of the Lombardi Trophy a convenience, no matter how close or far fans live from Indianapolis.

Dungy said he can't recall hearing about a similar tour for the trophy when previous franchises have won Super Bowls.

We want to be able to share the excitement with the fans, and we couldn't think of a better way to do it," Dungy said. "Jim felt it was important to let people who had been so supportive all year feel a part of it, and he didn't want them to have to come all the way to Indianapolis.

and started for a long time." Perhaps Thomas should recheck his history.

Since 2002, there have been nearly as many busts as hits among offensive linemen picked in the top 10. Arizona's Leonard Davis, in 2001, and Oakland's Robert Gallery, in 2004, were both chosen No. 2 overall but have not yet met expectations. Mike Williams, chosen fourth overall in 2002 by Buffalo, was eventually cut by the Bills before signing with Jackson-

ville last year. D'Brickashaw Ferguson of the New York Jets had a solid rookie year and appears to have a promising future, but Thomas hopes to

become an immediate star. Thomas' tools are unique.

At 6-foot-6, 311 pounds, he offers prototypical size, is strong enough to have reached a preliminary round of the Olympic Trials in shot put as a sophomore and is still agile enough to high jump 6-feet.

He demonstrated enough versatility at Wisconsin to fill in at defensive end while establishing himself as a dominant tackle and proved gritty enough to return from a torn anterior cruciate ligament in January 2006 and earn

All-American honors last season. Scouts are enamored with the rare combination, although some will undoubtedly ask how he's different from Gallery, Williams and Davis. Thomas already has an

game, but I'm a different player," he said. "I think I'm very technically sound, I have a great work ethic, I study hard, and I'm a pretty athletic offensive lineman."

Another factor in Thomas' favor is the legacy Wisconsin linemen have had in the NFL.

From Hall-of-Famer Mike Webster to workhorses such as Paul Gruber, Casey Rabach and Mark Tauscher, the Badgers have had a relatively good history of linemen in the league.

Now the polite Thomas intends to add to that reputation doing it his own way.

Thomas, who grew up a Green Bay Packers fan in his native Wisconsin, skipped the usual precombine workouts in warm weather to start preparing for next season, wherever he might play.

Thomas is projected to go in the top five picks, possibly as high as No. 2 to Detroit. After using three first-round picks on receivers in the past four years, the Lions may look elsewhere for help.
