

Student fatally stabbed

Police: Classmate, 16, blurts out 'I did it,' charged with murder

FRAMINGHAM, Mass. A 15-year-old boy was stabbed to death Friday in a hallway at his high school in an affluent Boston suburb, and a classmate was charged with murder after blurting out, "I did it, I did it," authorities said.

Investigators would not comment on a motive. John Odgren, 16, pleaded not guilty in the killing of 15-year-old James Alenson and was jailed without bail. He was to be tried as an adult.

Odgren's attorney, Jonathan Shapiro, said Odgren has Asperger's syndrome, a form of autism, and has been taking medications for many years.

"The defendant has a history of fairly serious psychological diagnoses and has also suffered from hyperactivity dysfunction for many years," Shapiro said.

The two boys got into a fight in a bathroom, and it spilled out into a hallway at Lincoln-Sudbury Regional High in Sudbury, authorities said. Odgren stabbed Alenson twice with a long knife, once in the abdomen and once in the heart, prosecutor Daniel Bennett said.

"The timing of the stabbing strongly suggests that Mr. Odgren planned this premeditated murder," Bennett said.

Odgren blurts, "I did it" to police moments after the stabbing, and also said: "Is he OK? I don't want him to die," according to authorities.

\$2.4 million. Exactly how much Johnson County has collected was not available from the county treasurer's office.

Local governments, except in Marion County, get to keep all the tax money once the minimum amount needed for the stadium and convention center has been collected. Because Johnson County collects the tax locally, the county funds also get a boost from fees businesses pay when they don't turn over the tax money on time.

Of the six suburban counties that contribute, Hamilton County has raised the most and sent \$2.3 million for the projects, meaning consumers have paid at least \$4.6 million in about 18 months.

Boone and Shelby counties collected at least \$600,000 each.







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Tailgating Colts machine big part of local family

He may not run as well as he used to. He's been to dozens of Colts games after all.

But Morris and Rosemary Lucas' Colts bus is a part of the family.

He's taken them to all 11 home Colts games this year and to Nashville, Tenn., for the game against the Titans.

And yes, the faithful bus will take the family to the game Sunday.

Don't say it too loud, but the Lucas family is looking for bigger, better bus.

"I don't want to tell it yet," Morris Lucas said.

Photos of Peyton Manning, Marvin Harrison and Tony Dungy are plastered to the side of the bus, leaving no doubt as the reliable bus heads to the game Sunday that its passengers are diehard fans.

Each home game for the past four years, the Lucas family has piled into the bus to go downtown for some pre-game partying before cheering on the Colts at the RCA Dome.

When Lucas saw the bus parked on Rockville Road with a "for sale" sign on it about four years ago, he couldn't resist.

He transformed the old 1987 Ford bus into a Colts tailgating machine. Blue flames stream from the front of the bus.

The phrases "Loud and Proud" and "The Stampede" are fixed to the bus. All of the artwork was provided by Lucas' company, Lucas Digital Graphics.

When Morris Lucas bought the bus, he ripped up the old carpet and replaced it with royal blue flooring. Most of the seats were taken out, and the bus now has a big-screen television.

No pre-game shows will be played on the TV.

Instead, the Lucases' sons will

play NFL video games before the game. Four of the Lucases' five sons, ages 11, 12, 14, 15 and 19, will go along for the game.

Inside the bus, everything glows blue as light shines through the blue-tinted windows.

Colts rugs are placed at the entrance of the old church bus, and Colts camping chairs are ready for tailgating.

Stuffed "touchdown monkeys" sit inside. A Colts clock and Colts plaques hang on the wall.

Usually after the final home game of the year, Lucas will move the bus from its spot in front of Lucas Digital Graphic to a different business he owns to store it until next season.

After the Colts divisional playoff win against Baltimore, he decided to wait to move it. He refused to give up, knowing the Colts would be coming back to the dome, he said.

Sure enough, the bus will make one more trip to the dome.

While the bus may take the

family to its biggest game yet on Sunday, nothing is going to change.

Morris Lucas said he will wear his Peyton Manning jersey as usual. When he tried to wear something different to a game, the Colts lost, he said.

They'll get to their downtown tailgating spot to set up about 12:30 p.m.

Each game they listen to music and pre-game coverage, cook on the grill that's attached to the back of the bus, set up backyard games, have a campfire and hang out with friends from the Center Grove area and others they have met at games.

This week, 50-plus people will come to tailgate before the game, Morris Lucas said.

Plans for next year already are in the works. They hope to get a new bus so they can take it to a game in Atlanta, Morris Lucas said.

They hauled 12 people down to Tennessee this season for a game

against the Titans, stopping every 90 minutes for gas, Morris Lucas said.

The tailgating in Tennessee was the best of the year, Rosemary Lucas said.

The ride home wasn't as fun, Morris Lucas said, referring to the Colts' loss.

If the freezing temperatures and snow come Sunday, the Lucases will not be fair-weather fans.

They will be outside grilling and listening to pre-game coverage on the radio.

They've stayed outside even after the propane tanks froze, Morris Lucas said.

They tailgated when Jim Harbaugh threw for the Colts. They tailgated when the Colts ended the season with a 3-13 record. The Lucas family has had season tickets for 11 years.

Fans today are spoiled, Morris Lucas said.

"You expect to win now," he said.

times as much staff. Some have set up heated tents to make room for more seating. Extra wings and other appetizers have been ordered, but the biggest call has been for beer.

Those who run the restaurants and watering holes where Hoosiers will gather to watch the game expect their dining rooms to be packed with fans.

Restaurant managers said they expect those people will drink, not eat. They are counting on alcohol to make up the difference in Sunday dinner tabs on game day.

Friends will come early, grab a seat and sit for hours at places that normally see smaller parties come and go in an hour or two after ordering full meals.

A few bars and restaurants said they expect to see higher than normal earnings. But managers at other establishments said they are just banking on folks making great memories and then returning.

About 30 percent more cases of Budweiser and 15 percent more Miller beer has been ordered for Indianapolis restaurants and bars this weekend, local distributors said.

Indianapolis was close to a beer

crisis, said Jim Zink Sr., president of Zink Distributing Co. He was placing emergency orders with distributors in Columbus, Ohio, and St. Louis this week. Pubs and restaurants in and around Indianapolis are counting on folks drinking up the difference in what they would normally pay in food bills during the Colts and Chicago Bears playoff games.

At Champs Americana restaurant in Indianapolis, food sales usually outnumber liquor and beer 5 to 1. On Sunday, manager Adam Hatch said, he expects them to sell at about an even rate. Some diners will eat a meal when they get to the restaurant or may order an appetizer or two during the first half, but people will mostly order drinks throughout the games, he said.

"We will do (in overall sales) what we normally do. We will just see food go down and alcohol pick up," he said.

The restaurant plans to set up an outdoor seating area and bring in extra cocktail waiters and waitresses to cover the extra alcohol orders. Local beers from each of the cities playing in the playoffs have been brought in for the occasion, he said.

At Damon's in Center Grove, assistant manager Andy Maraldo said he expects to see a sort of vacuum effect with slow business Friday night and maybe even

Saturday, as those in the suburbs wait to go out on Sunday.

Sales for the day on Sunday will probably be about the same as they normally would as food sales go down and alcohol sales go up, he said. "We are just happy that people come in and experience the restaurant. It is a good time. It gets pretty rowdy in here," he said.

Since the playoffs started, Anne Atherton, general manager of Buffalo Wild Wings in Greenwood, has ordered beer more often.

She said she has been buying 50 percent more than what she normally purchases for the restaurant and bar and has been placing orders every week instead of every week and a half.

At Jillian's on Meridian Street in Indianapolis, assistant general manager Anthony Deardorf expects some people to sit for the entire game, but many will come and go and enjoy the other festivities downtown.

He said he has tripled the number of people who would normally be taking orders and busing tables at the restaurant and bar on a Sunday. Deardorf put in a double order for beer for the weekend.

Bob Schofield, owner of The Willard in Franklin, said he expects to do great business Sunday. Folks will come in early, bringing in crowds at times on a Sunday when business is usually slow.
