A man suspected of dealing methamphetamines and prescription drugs tried to eat some of the contraband as he was arrested, police said.

Officers used a stun gun to stop the man from putting any more narcotics into his mouth after they were unable to physically stop him from eating it, according to a report from the Greenwood Police Department.

The man overdosed and was taken to a local hospital.

Michael Scott Young, 30, 141 Northwood Drive, Greenwood, is being charged in Johnson County with dealing in methamphetamine and two charges of dealing in a

schedule II controlled substance.

Young was arrested by Greenwood police in December. He was turned over to police in Marion County, where there was a warrant out for his arrest.

Greenwood police learned about a drug deal he was going to make in December to sell 3.5 grams of methamphetamine for \$300 and two pills of the prescription pain reliever OxyContin for \$25 each, according to police.

Officers watched him enter a Subway restaurant in Greenwood, exchange the drugs for the money, then leave, the report said. Once he was outside, he was handcuffed. While on the ground, he attempted to eat several pills, the report said.

Police ordered him to spit out

the drugs, but he kept trying to put more in his mouth, according to the report.

Police tried to force Young to spit out the pills. When they were unsuccessful, they used the stun gun.

After that, he spit out what appeared to be partially chewed pills.

Young passed out at the police department and was taken to the hospital.

Parents tell police man had sex with daughter

A New Whiteland man was arrested after a 14-year-old girl told her parents the two engaged in sexual intercourse, police said.

Robert L. Rynard, 34, 304 Oakden Road, was arrested on three counts of sexual misconduct with a minor.

Police arrested him Tuesday


after they searched his home and questioned him about his relationship with the teen.

Rynard told police he and the girl engaged in sexual intercourse during a relationship that lasted nearly two months, New Whiteland Town Marshal Ed Stephenson said.

The girls' parents reported the relationship to police, Stephenson said.

Police still are investigating and have sent DNA evidence to the state lab along with Rynard's computers, which Stephenson said is typical in a sexual misconduct case.

Rynard was taken to the Johnson County jail, where he is being held on \$60,000 bond.

Woman wants shorter trip to grocery store

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A Greenwood woman makes a couple of pilgrimages to the northside of Indianapolis each month seeking healthy, affordable groceries.

Now, Jane Greer thinks it's time for Trader Joe's grocery store to find a home in Johnson County.

The Sugar Grove Elementary School nurse sent an e-mail to all Center Grove school e-mail users hoping to rally support for a store.

She encouraged everyone to visit the company's Web site to send a request for a store in the Greenwood area.

Trader Joe's is not a specialty store like some may think, she said. It's a regular grocery store that offers inexpensive, healthy goods, along with items that other grocery stores don't carry, she said.

The store carries vegetarian, kosher and organic groceries, director of national publicity Alison Mochizuki said.

Greer said she thought if

enough people showed there was a need and desire for a store in the area, Trader Joe's would consider it.

"I really believe the southside could support one," she said.

Both of the northside locations, at 2902 W. 86th St. and 5473 E. 82nd St., opened in 2001, Mochizuki said.

Trader Joe's corporate office will not release how store loca-

tions are chosen or what areas they are considering for new stores, Mochizuki said.

"It is such an honor to be wanted, but wooing does not go into the decision-making factor," she said.

Upcoming stores will open in California, Georgia and Illinois, she said.

Trader Joe's has about 275 stores in 23 states, she said. The stores carry regular grocery items along with more than 2,000 unique products from around the world, she said.

For now, Greer and others backing her pleas will keep making the drive and hoping Trader Joe's will find a home on the southside.
