played six seasons for the Pacers and finished with career per game averages

of 16 points and 19.4 rebounds. His most memorable game occurred March 18, 1969, when he had 37 points and 26 rebounds — in the second half against the New York Nets.

He finished with 56 points and 31 rebounds in a performance indicative of why he's one of only four former Pacers players to have his jersey (No. 34) retired. Reggie Miller, Roger Brown and George McGinnis are the others. Brown and McGinnis were Daniels' teammates.

I was fortunate enough to play with some very, very good people," said Daniels, who finished his career with the NBA's New York Nets in 1977 but has always remained a Pacer at heart.

Thirty years after his playing days ended, he still regards the ABA Pacers as the best in pro basketball at the time. And he makes no apology to the NBA for

Was it a long time ago? Yes. Does it seem like a long time ago? No, because I was fortunate enough to participate in the early Pacers," Daniels said. "I think we've been overlooked a little bit. We were the class of the league. We were

the class of both leagues. "Everybody wanted to play for us. We won three championships. ... We didn't

make as much money (as today's players), but we had a hell of a lot of fun.'

Echoing a sentiment often voiced by former teammates, Daniels attributes the Pacers' ABA success to a rare camaraderie the organization and others still strive for.

Players were close on and off the court, the product of former coach Bobby

"Slick" Leonard's influence. Leonard not only insisted players become friends, he often joined in the offcourt revelry.

"Those types of things are put in motion by the guys you have in charge, and Slick was that type of guy," Daniels said. "After every game, you had to go to a bar and spend a half-hour or 45 minutes together. That was every game. It was something that he installed, and all of a sudden it became a part of the

Indiana Pacers. 'We spent time with one another, and that's how we became closer. And in order to play for the Indiana Pacers, you had to understand the rules, that this is a team and this is a family, and if one person was hurt, you hurt everybody. So

he set the tone for us." Although recent events don't always reflect it, the Pacers' mission has never changed with regard to the roster. The goal is not only to find talented players, but talented players who mesh and forge a championship bond.

Indiana had that sort of chemistry during the ABA years and throughout most of the 1990s and early 2000s.

Daniels is confident the Pacers are on the cusp of having it again.

"These younger guys are getting it now," he said. "They're finally trying to get that feel. Jermaine (O'Neal) has been above everyone's expectations.

"He's matured into a leader. He's maturing into a leader and a guy who holds everybody responsible.

When Daniels isn't scouring the country for future talent, he spends time on his horse farm in Sheridan with his wife, CeCe. Daniels grew up in urban Detroit but

always had an interest in horses. His interest blossomed into passion when he played basketball at the University of New Mexico, when he vowed to own a horse if he could ever afford to. "I've kind of taken that to another level.

I have 15," said Daniels, who raises and trains the animals on his farm. "I love them. I absolutely love them. They're athletes who don't require a contract. They give you everything they have.

"All you have to do is take care of them. But basketball and the Pacers are Daniels' first true loves with regard to vocation. He holds each in equally high regard and vows the team will again

contend for a championship, sooner rather than later. "I identify with the Pacers in a family way," Daniels said. "It's part of who I am, being associated with the team that long, and I'm very passionate about the

Indiana Pacers. "We'll get this thing back to where it was when I played. I know it's crazy, but it can be done.'


